

FINANCIAL SUMMARY

March operations benefited from a number of prepaid annual pledges that have us running well ahead of 2021 on a total income basis. Income exceeded expenses for the month and YTD. This favorable pattern has continued since the beginning of the year.

Overall operating expenses were in line with budget, but higher than last year. Property expenses were notably higher due to utilities and tree trimming work along Chestnut Street. The March electric bill was significantly higher in spite of lower usage due to a large rate hike.

As mentioned last month, a capital reserve fund of approximately \$92k was established with our 2021 operating surplus plus a portion of the proceeds from the sale of 211 N Concord. In March, \$15.5k was dispersed from this account to replace the sewer line in the parking lot.

VESTRY HIGHLIGHTS BY JOHN GOUVEIA, SECRETARY

Leslie Morgan opened us in prayer with thoughts about change. Change can be thought of as good, bad, scary, and happens daily. We should remember that we are not alone. When we act in community, we can adapt to change.

With that in mind, we continued discussion and discernment regarding the use of 209 North Concord Street. Some people expressed concern over this building during and after the sale of 211 North Concord. The Vestry had determined that we did not wish to be a landlord in the traditional sense as that was not our mission. After discussions that had taken place over the last months, we determined that the property can best be used as transitional housing for families being supported through St. John's ministries. Whether it is used by refugees, returning citizens, or any other ministry effort, this would further our mission. We did set a time limit in that we would not rent to a family for more than two years.


We then received a capsule statement from our Open and Affirming Committee. This committee has done an outstanding job in defining what it means to be an "Open and Affirming Church."

We recognize that we may not be there yet, but we have a statement of our ideals identifying who we want to be as St. John's Episcopal Church in Lancaster PA. The Vestry accepted the statement with our full support. Additional information regarding next steps and the statement itself will be forthcoming.

It was noted that the Presiding Bishop (The Most Rev. Michael Curry) will be visiting the Diocese on Saturday, June 11. We are following up with the Diocese as to arrangements.

THE HEALING OF OUR COMMUNITY BY JOE WAY

There was a scientific study done in 2019 that offered people a choice between giving themselves electric shocks or being alone with their thoughts for 15 minutes. Many chose electric shock! Take it or leave it, the pandemic has given us all time to inwardly reflect and spend time alone trying to figure things out amidst this ongoing global pandemic.

Instead of electric shock, I elected to add prayer to my long daily commute. Through this discipline of daily prayer, I found a fuller sense of awareness of my needs as well as the needs of my family, friends, and community. Hey St. John's! I know some of you know the Soles4Souls shoe collection program really well, and some of you may not. Let me share a little about what it's all about according to them:

"Turning shoes into opportunity: People living in poverty want a better life, but many lack opportunity. At S4S, we turn unwanted shoes and clothing into opportunity, by keeping them from going to waste and putting them to good use – providing relief, creating jobs and empowering people to break the cycle of poverty. We are 4 making a difference. Our programs are focused on making a measurable impact on people and the planet.

- Providing relief We collect new shoes and clothing to distribute to people in need across the U.S. and around the world.
- Fighting poverty We help people launch and sustain their own small business selling donated shoes and clothing.
- The planet We're protecting the environment by putting used goods to good use, instead of wasting away in a landfill.
- Empowering women We aim to empower women, ensuring they have the opportunity and recognition they deserve.

Most people own many more pairs of shoes than they wear. By hosting a shoe drive, you put all of that unused footwear to work—literally!

- Create opportunity Gently used shoes you collect get funneled to developing countries, where people start small businesses to sell them.
- Generate income By selling shoes, business owners have money to provide for their family—and people who need shoes the most get them at a price they can afford.
- Provide relief Funds generated through our micro-enterprise program allow us to use 100% of donor contributions for direct assistance and disaster relief programs in all 50 states.
- Protect the environment By repurposing discarded shoes and clothing, you keep them out of landfills and help promote sustainability.



All of the shoes from your drive will go into micro-enterprise programs in developing countries around the world. These programs serve as long-term opportunities to break the cycle of poverty for those in need. When the shoes arrive, they are sorted and, together with our partners, we determine where they need to be sent to make the most impact."

Now, on to the best part. This collection, thanks to all of you, we had an amazing sendoff of 1,369 pairs of shoes!! We want to thank every one of you for your compassion and generosity in continually bringing in your gently worn shoes. As a reminder, we are always collecting shoes at any time during the year, and you should be able to find boxes for this all over the St. John's campus. So you never need to worry about when we are collecting – we are always collecting!


