RECTOR'S MESSAGE



Mental Health Workshop

Dear St. John's family and friends,

On Saturday, September 24, a group of folks gathered in the parish hall to participate in a workshop entitled: A Faithful Response to the Mental Health Crisis. It was an inspiring morning facilitated by members of The National Alliance for Mental Illness, the Lancaster City Police Social Workers, and resident usher and psychologist, Paul Dorgan.

The purpose of the workshop was to build partnerships with others in our community around a shared mission – to love our neighbors. We spent the morning gaining insight and instruction about mental illness and learned helpful and healthy ways to engage with those suffering, such as the LEAP method and using I statements vs. you statements. Throughout our time together, personal stories were shared, our community expanded, and tools and resources were offered. I was both inspired and grateful for the conversation. It goes without saying that there is a great deal of stigma around the mental health crisis. Yet, one in five Americans are dealing with a mental illness. There is a misconception in our society that places blame on an individual for the symptoms they present. It's easier to brush off someone when you can claim it's their own fault, yet mental illness is no more a choice then getting cancer or having high cholesterol. Mental illnesses are biologically based brain disorders that cannot be overcome through will power.

The heart of our morning centered around the truth that there isn't a person we will encounter who isn't loved by God. There isn't a mental health illness or crisis that can separate God from God's beloved. As a community of faith, centered on seeking and serving Christ in all persons, we have a responsibility to proclaim that truth through word and deed. A faithful response will always require compassion and mutual respect.

Our own Lord and Savior spent much of his ministry with those in crisis. He listened, engaged, and loved people into wholeness and relationship. We have much to learn from Him! I invite you to look into the following resources to learn more:

OUTREACH

REPORT by John Gouveia



September has been an exciting time to be a part of St. John's Outreach ministries. If you have not already joined us, you are welcome to do so now.

Refugee Family- We have welcomed the Abdi family and settled them into our church-owned property. Our volunteer teams are now ready to spring into action. CWS has given us the task of tracking time spent and expenses in support of this mission. All volunteers have been advised that they must go through Safeguarding God's Children training and have their clearances up to date.

Returning Citizens- Faith Food & Fellowship had their first gathering at Beth Shalom. We had four volunteers serve three moms and four kids. This was the first time, so the moms are just getting to know us. Community Breakfast- We fed approximately 95 people in August. Our numbers were in the fifties a few months ago.

Martha's Ministry- The Martha's are preparing for their year-end sale. They are also knitting hats to go into the Fence Ministry.

Food Pantry- we served 158 families in August. This continues the substantial increases we have experienced over the last two years. It was about 12 families weekly two years ago. As a result, some of the equipment is failing. We can use some additional volunteers for the Tuesday/Thursday shifts and for the Wednesday morning handling of our bulk delivery form the Central PA Food Bank.

Blessings Box- The use has increased greatly this year. We do not watch to see who is taking the food. We just have to restock more often.

REFUGEE MINISTRY

Welcoming the Abdi Family:

On August 31, a group from St. John's, with banners and balloons, welcomed the Abdi family as it arrived at Lancaster airport. Father, Bati, and Abdalla, his eight-year old son, had arrived in Lancaster in June. The other three members of the family. Mom. Halima, fourteen-year old daughter, Sutan, and sixteen-year old son, Abidiisa, had flown a day earlier from Kenya into Kennedy Airport and were driven to Lancaster. That same day, they were able to move into a fullyfurnished, newly repainted, and fullystocked home - the result of many hours of hard work by St. John's parishioners. Abdalla is in school, and Abidiisa and Sutan will be enrolled shortly.

The family, from Ethiopia, were in Kenya. A brief note from Church World Service: The father, Bati, arrived in Lancaster with one of his sons, Abdalla, back in June. The long, arduous and bureaucratic system for refugee resettlement had split the family in two, meaning that the mother (Halima) and the other two kids (Abidiisa and Sutan) had to stay behind in Kenya to wait for their turn to be resettled to a safe third country.

The St. John's Welcome Team has been assisting the family transition to its new life in Lancaster. Helping them get set-up at home, driving them to various appointments, food shopping, and just patiently responding to many questions are among the things we've done to help them feel comfortable as they adjust to their new neighborhood. Some of the things we understand fully are alien to them; but they are very eager to learn and they've expressed how thankful they are for all the help and kindness from St. John's. Any transition can be challenging and we've found that flexibility is the key word.

The Vestry began working on the 2023 Budget. With a second paid Clergyperson on staff, a reorganization of our Lay Staff, and the challenges of getting our people, property, and finances more effective in accomplishing our mission, the become an exciting place to be.

As we start each new program year, it is a time to look forward while also taking stock of where we are. We had a very strong start to our Sunday School and youth group, and our newly formed Faith, Food, and Fellowship (3Fs) programs. The Community Breakfast team fed more people than they had in the past two years. The Food Pantry has grown so substantially that we now have to invest in some heavy equipment and also consider if it is possible to relocate them to a more accessible spot. You, our pledging members, provided outstanding financial support to our ministries over the summer. In all, it is an exciting time to be a part of St. John's.

Our challenge for the future is that the needs of the community, both inside and outside our membership, keep increasing. How do we better care for our aging members? How do keep in better touch with our members we do not see regularly? How do we better support the staff at Fulton Elementary? How do we replace the HVAC system?

The exciting thing is that these questions are not insurmountable. They are issues we can address with the leadership and support of our members. Clergy and lay staff will provide us with the leadership and vision. We the church members can never forget our mission statement. Grow in God. Act in Service. Witness in Love.

Women helping WONEN

27 years ago, at the Samaritan Counseling Center, 150 women formed a group Silent Samaritans, to set up a fund specifically for women who may lack the necessary funds for counseling. Each year, over 300 women contribute to this fund raising close to \$50,000 on an annual basis. A luncheon is held in November with a women speaker. This year our speaker is Timbrel Chayatee a native of India who employs Indian women in the making of the items she sell in her shop Chayatee in downtown Lancaster. Cost to attend the luncheon is \$100 a major portion of which is tax deductible. This year again Pastor Amanda will be giving the invocation. August was an exceptional month for operating income, given an unusually high receipt of annual pledge offerings. Expenses for each operating category were also below budget average for the month. The result is a highly favorable surplus for August and YTD. Based on historic norms, these trends are expected to reverse as the year plays out. August marks the first month with staffing costs approaching budget levels. Continued inflation of utility costs also remains a challenge. These higher expenses will likely cause us to tap our budgeted investment income in the near term. Overall however, the outlook to complete the year with a balanced operating budget appears likely.

St. John's Food Pantry is meeting increasing needs in our community, and we couldn't do it without you!

If you love to shop: We could use soap, shampoo, toothpaste, diapers of any size, feminine products, deodorant, and facial tissues.

Updates and Needs:

Making a difference in our neighbors' lives: Our Lancaster neighbors are very appreciative of our offerings. Some of our working poor have shared stories about how they could not qualify for government benefits but we've enabled them to feed their families. And as some Covid benefit programs have been phased out, St. John's Food Pantry has helped to fill some of the empty spaces.

Additional (one-time) needs: Due to many, many trips across the threshold between the lobby and courtyard, our storage carts (from which we allow visitors to choose toiletries and other "extras") have gotten wobbly wheels and are in danger of collapsing. We've ordered 2 sturdy, industrial-grade carts to replace these, but we would also like to buy a rolling flatbed and some storage containers for grouping items on the carts. The total for all of these items would be about \$1000; might you consider sponsoring part of that additional amount? Changing needs: In the last few years before Covid, we consistently averaged 8-9 visitors per week, and our annual budget was \$2000, all of which was supported by contributions from parishioners (in addition to donations of food). Since the beginning of Covid, we've averaged 3-4 times that number (32/week so far in 2022). Our budget, of necessity, rose to \$12,000/year, and your contributions grew to meet the need. Also, from April 2021 through March 2022, we received free boxes of food from the Central PA Food Bank, due to special Covid-related grants, so that helped us stay within our budget for 2021. It also allowed us to provide some toiletries, which people can't buy with their SNAP benefits. Due to the ending of some grants, the Food Bank's free-food program ended March 31 of this year, and while we still buy food from the Food Bank at very discounted prices, we've already spent our 2022 budget. (As of the end of August, we'd received contributions of about 2/3 of that amount, which is not surprising, since we're 2/3 of the way through the year.)
