
THE FIRST SUNDAY OF ADVENT HOLY EUCHARIST: RITE II NOVEMBER 27TH AT 10:15 A.M.

LITRUGY EXPLAINED

The Introit is a sung or chanted Psalm of praise, which is meant to set the service in joy and anticipation of what is to come; the choir remains in the back of the sanctuary as messengers or announcers, like the angels to the shepherds near Bethlehem.

LITURGY EXPLAINED

Hymns have been a part of the entrance rite since the year 430.

The **Opening Hymn** is walking music as it symbolizes our movement towards the altar in prayer. We've come from different places and situations, but we all come here to journey towards the altar under the sign of the Cross.

LITURGY EXPLAINED

The concept of the Advent Wreath originated among German Lutherans in the 16th century. It symbolizes the passage of the four weeks of Advent in the liturgical calendar and signifies hope in the midst of darkness. Beginning with the First Sunday of Advent, an additional candle is lit on each subsequent Sunday until, by the last Sunday of Advent, all four candles are lit. The Christ candle is lit on Christmas Eve or Day.

LIGHTING OF THE ADVENT WREATH

When I look around, I see shadows of hunger. So many neighbors, nearby and around the world, will go to bed hungry tonight...When I look around, I see shadows of injustice, the rich getting richer and the poor getting poorer — and someone somewhere will fall asleep under a bridge tonight...In the face of hunger, in the face of injustice, in the face of despair, we light a candle of hope... (Light the first candle in your Advent wreath.)

May the light from this candle overwhelm the world. May the light from this candle say to all that God's hope is coming on earth as it already is in heaven. Friends, be not afraid, God's hope is at hand!

OPENING ACCLAMATION (please remain standing if you are able)

Officiant Bless the Lord who forgives all our sins;

People His mercy endures for ever.

LITURGY EXPLAINED

The Collect for Purity is based on Psalm 51 and is a prayer of preparation for worship. It reveals that God intimately knows us and asks God to cleanse us from all the stress and anxiety of the world, so that when we enter the church, we might focus on worship and being spiritually fed.

COLLECT FOR PURITY

BCP 355

Almighty God, to you all hearts are open, all desires known, and from you no secrets are hid: Cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you, and worthily magnify your holy Name; through Christ our Lord. *Amen.*

LITURGY EXPLAINED

The **Trisagion** is an ancient hymn of the eastern church. The term is from the Greek, meaning "thrice holy."

LITURGY EXPLAINED

The Collect of the Day is a prayer which 'collects' us or gathers us together in common prayer. This collect reflects the readings of the day.

THE COLLECT OF THE DAY

Celebrant The Lord be with you.

People And also with you.

Celebrant Let us pray.

Almighty God, give us grace to cast away the works of darkness, and put on the armor of light, now in the time of this mortal life in which your Son Jesus Christ came to visit us in great humility; that in the last day, when he shall come again in his glorious majesty to judge both the living and the dead, we may rise to the life immortal; through him who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. *Amen*.


THE FIRST LESSON: Isaiah 2:1-5 (please be seated)

The word that Isaiah son of Amoz saw concerning Judah and Jerusalem. In days to come the mountain of the Lord's house shall be established as the highest of the mountains, and shall be raised above the hills; all the nations shall stream to it. Many peoples shall come and say, 'Come, let us go up to the mountain of the Lord, to the house of the God of Jacob; that he may teach us his ways and that we may walk in his paths.' For out of Zion shall go forth instruction, and the word of the Lord from Jerusalem. He shall judge between the nations, and shall arbitrate for many peoples; they shall beat their swords into ploughshares, and their spears into pruning-hooks; nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war any more. O house of Jacob, come, let us walk in the light of the Lord!

THE HOLY GOSPEL: Matthew 24:36-44 (please remain standing if you are able)

Celebrant The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus said to the disciples, "But about that day and hour no one knows, neither the angels of heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father. For as the days of Noah were, so will be the coming of the Son of Man. For as in those days before the flood they were eating and drinking, marrying and giving in marriage, until the day Noah entered the ark, and they knew nothing until the flood came and swept them all away, so too will be the coming of the Son of Man. Then two will be in the field; one will be taken and one will be left. Two women will be grinding meal together; one will be taken and one will be left.

Keep awake therefore, for you do not know on what day your Lord is coming. But understand this: if the owner of the house had known in what part of the night the thief was coming, he would have stayed awake and would not have let his house be broken into. Therefore you also must be ready, for the Son of Man is coming at an unexpected hour."

SERMON

THE REV. AMANDA KNOUSE

THE NICENE CREED (please stand if you are able)

BCP 358

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. (pause) For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son.
With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified.
He has spoken through the Prophets.
We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church.
We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins.
We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In him, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

On the night before he died for us, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

If you do not wish to receive the wine, cross your arms over your chest when the wine passes. If you desire a blessing instead of communion, simply cross your arms over your chest.

St. John's Traveler Letter:

Connecting to our siblings in Christ across the world
Did you know St. John's has a team of pilgrims who travel every week to the very places
we pray for in the Anglican communion? Follow John as he shares a little bit about the
church and the places he visits:

Dear Pastor Amanda,

Kon'nichiwa from Japan! It's halftime during today's World Cup soccer match and I'm standing in crowded plaza in the small town of Pippu watching Japan play Germany. The crowd is dressed in white and red to reflect the Japanese flag – a red circle on a white background to represent the Land of the Rising Sun.

Despite the fans here in Pippu, most Japanese aren't soccer crazy like people in Europe or South America. Baseball and sumo wrestling are top dog here. Soccer fans are used to being in the minority, and that's ok, because everyone gets along anyway! It's similar to Christianity being the minority here in Japan – only one percent of Japanese people are Christians, and an even fewer percentage are Episcopalian or Anglican. That said, there's a lot of respect for those who have a different religious background – such as those who are Buddhist or Shinto or no religion at all!

Earlier today I prayed at the Pippu Shrine, a beautiful Shinto shrine decorated with flags and banners and surrounded by a beautiful garden. I, an Episcopalian, was praying next to a woman in a Shinto robe, who was next to a man who was deep in a Buddhist meditation. It gives me hope to see that even amongst people with very different backgrounds, we can still come together, put aside our differences, and accept each other – when it comes to religion, or soccer, or anything else! It can be a scary world out there, but moments such as this give me hope that the future is bright.

Wishing you similar hope and acceptance in the days and months ahead as we move toward Christmas!


