
THE FOURTH SUNDAY OF ADVENT HOLY EUCHARIST: RITE II DECEMBER 18TH AT 10:15 A.M.

Celebrant The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Now the birth of Jesus the Messiah took place in this way. When his mother Mary had been engaged to Joseph, but before they lived together, she was found to be with child from the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a righteous man and unwilling to expose her to public disgrace, planned to dismiss her quietly. But just when he had resolved to do this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, "Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary as your wife, for the child conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will bear a son, and you are to name him Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins." All this took place to fulfill what had been spoken by the Lord through the prophet: "Look, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and they shall name him Emmanuel," which means, "God is with us." When Joseph awoke from sleep, he did as the angel of the Lord commanded him; he took her as his wife, but had no marital relations with her until she had borne a son; and he named him Jesus.

We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you.

In him, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

On the night before he died for us, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore, according to his command, O Father,

We remember his death, We proclaim his resurrection, We await his coming in glory;

And we offer our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving to you, O Lord of all; presenting to you, from your creation, this bread and this wine.

We pray you, gracious God, to send your Holy Spirit upon these gifts that they may be the Sacrament of the Body of Christ and his Blood of the new Covenant. Unite us to your Son in his sacrifice, that we may be acceptable through him, being sanctified by the Holy Spirit. In the fullness of time, put all things in subjection under your Christ, and bring us to that heavenly country where, with St. John and all your saints, we may enter the everlasting heritage of your sons and daughters; through Jesus Christ our Lord, the firstborn of all creation, the head of the Church, and the author of our salvation.

LITURGY EXPLAINED

When asked to teach his disciples to pray, Jesus taught the prayer that has become beloved throughout the world and across the centuries. **The Lord's Prayer** is profound in its directness and simplicity. Jesus first blesses the name of God and prays for God's heavenly kingdom to be realized in this world, then prays for our basic needs for daily sustenance to be filled as they arise, asks for forgiveness as we ourselves forgive, and strength to face trials and to be carried by God from the evil that befalls us.

THE LORD'S PRAYER HYMNAL S-149

And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to sing,

LITURGY EXPLAINED

The Fraction, where we break the bread, symbolizes that Christ's body was broken for us. The language of the Passover is important here. We celebrate the Passover of the Exodus and Christ's victory over the grave in our acclamation. The breaking of the bread makes it possible for all to share in that life. If the fraction symbolizes the life of Christ laid down for us, and we ourselves are the Body of Christ, then the fraction becomes a symbol of the shape of our own behavior. We, too, like our crucified and risen Lord, give ourselves to be broken for the life of the world, and find new life in offering ourselves for that breaking.

THE BREAKING OF THE BREAD

BCP 365

Celebrant Christ our Passover is sacrificed for us;

People Therefore let us keep the feast.

LITURGY EXPLAINED

The Invitation to partake in communion follows. There are numerous ways to receive Communion. You may drink from the chalice, or dip your wafer, which is known as intinction. You may also receive just the bread. When I distribute communion and say, "The body of Christ, the bread of heaven," I use those words to pray for you; I trust that you, too, are prayerfully and thankfully receiving the gift of the Eucharist.

THE INVITATION

The Gifts of God for the People of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

ADMINISTRATION OF COMMUNION

The Episcopal Church invites all who seek God to our Lord's table. If you wish to receive, please come forward to the altar rail when the usher indicates. Hold out your hands to receive the bread. For the wine, you can receive by guiding the chalice to your lips or by dipping your wafer into the intinction cup. If you do not wish to receive the wine, cross your arms over your chest when the wine passes. If you desire a blessing instead of communion, simply cross your arms over your chest.

LITURGY EXPLAINED

After communion, we often commission Lay Eucharistic Visitors to take the sacrament from this celebration to our friends at home who are unable to be here. They receive communion, being reminded of the community's and God's care and love for them.

SENDING FORTH OF THE EUCHARISTIC VISITORS

Celebrant In the name of God and on behalf of this parish, I send you forth bearing

these holy gifts, that those to whom you go may share with us in the

communion of Christ's body and blood. We who are many are one body.

People Because we all share one bread, one cup.

LITURGY EXPLAINED

In the early church, you left after communion. But as the church got bigger and more formal, it needed a real ending. In the **Post Communion Prayer**, we summarize what has happened in the service and pray for God's continual guidance and grace in our lives. Empowered by Christ's presence, united to him most intimately at the table, we prepare to return to a world in which the kingdom is coming but not yet present in abundance. There is work to be done.

POST COMMUNION PRAYER

BCP 365

Eternal God, heavenly Father, you have graciously accepted us as living members of your Son our Savior Jesus Christ, and you have fed us with spiritual food in the Sacrament of his Body and Blood. Send us now into the world in peace, and grant us strength and courage to love and serve you with gladness and singleness of heart; through Christ our Lord. Amen.

LITURGY EXPLAINED

The Blessing began in Egypt around the 4th century. The priest is asking God to bless you so you can be a blessing to others who you will encounter in the world.

THE BLESSING

Go forth now into the world in peace. Be of good courage. Hold fast to that which is good. Render to no one evil for evil. Strengthen the faint hearted; support the weak; help the afflicted; honor everyone. Love and serve the Lord. And the blessing of God Almighty, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit be with you now and always. *Amen*.

LITURGY EXPLAINED

As we began with one voice, we end with one voice and process out into the world, having glorified God and being nourished by and filled with God's spirit for doing the work of the Gospel in our world.

St. John's Traveler Letter:

Connecting to our siblings in Christ across the world
Did you know St. John's has a team of pilgrims who travel every week to the very places
we pray for in the Anglican communion? Follow John as he shares a little bit about the
church and the places he visits:

Dear Pastor Amanda,

This past week I travelled from Kenya to Korea, on the eastern edge of Asia. I think you know that Korea was divided into North Korea and South Korea following the end of World War II, and I am in South Korea visiting the capital, Seoul, and also Daejeon city. I have been looking forward to coming here to say Kamsahamnida, "Thank You," in person. There was a turn of the usual events a couple of years ago. As the covid pandemic broke out in America, the Anglican Province of Korea sent aid packages to the Diocese of New York to assist with turning the Cathedral of St. John the Divine into a field hospital. At the time the primate of the Province of Korea, Bishop Moses Nag Jun Yoo said "The living Jesus Christ keeps telling us to love each other regardless of size, or race or any differences among us. This is the moment that the Word works out through the two connected Churches in Korea and the United States. Warmest hearts and lots of prayers go together with the hope of resurrected life of Jesus Christ to overcome Covid-19 for all in the package of aid." He continued that, "it's amazing that our smallest of diocese sends aid to the largest diocese in New York, but this is like Saint Paul, the smallest of the apostles, working with God's favor. Today God uses Daejeon Diocese as a tool of grace to give the same role as the apostle Paul."

We often hear of Mother Teresa saying, "we cannot all do great things, but we can all do small things with great love." The people of Korea sent what they could to help the people in America, and they sent it with great love. I've wanted to return and say a small "thank you," kamsahamnida, with great love. Please join me in thanking our wonderful Korean friends, and hold them up in your prayers today.

In 2005, his whole world turned upside down after a severe accident with a traumatic brain injury. He needed to relearn everything, including the motor skills for playing his instrument. The hard work and perseverance of learning the drums again helped his recovery. Now, every chance he has to play is a testament to how blessed he is to be alive and to bring joy to others.
