RECTOR'S MESSAGE

Dear St. John's,

If I were to ask you what the most important day of the church year was, my guess is, many of you would say Easter and you would be partially right. At the end of this month our forty day journey through Lent will culminate in the Resurrection of our Lord and Savior. We will celebrate Easter Sunday with much rejoicing. However, Easter was never meant to stand alone. At the very epicenter of our Liturgical Calendar is what is known as the Triduum; three days of liturgy which include Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and, of course, Easter.

It has become a common practice for church goers to pick and choose what services to attend during Holy Week. Some attend Maundy Thursday, others Good Friday, and some skip everything except for the festive Easter service. However, the triduum is one continuous liturgy spread over numerous days. To miss one piece is to miss the point of it all. To put it another way, skipping holy week is like the shortstop for the barnstormers showing up to the championship game without ever attending the practices.

Our worship during Holy Week is not simply a re-enactment of something that happened over 2000 years ago, but an actual participation in the events themselves through living faith. When we gather as a community of faith we are claiming that the life, death, and resurrection is a present reality.

This year our Holy Week will begin with festive celebrations on PALM SUNDAY. As we recall the triumphant entry of Jesus into Jerusalem, we will celebrate the arrival of our king with a procession around our church grounds, the waving of palms, and shouts of hosanna. MAUNDY THURSDAY will include the humble act of foot washing, communing with Christ and one another through the Holy Eucharist, and the poignant act of stripping the altar in preparation for Good Friday. Our GOOD FRIDAY liturgy will bear witness to the reality of our Lord's death and will echo the sentiments made by Richard Rohr who wrote, "Crucified Jesus, you are not a stranger to my soul, you are not foreign to our history. You have revealed, resolved, and forgiven it all on the cross. I join the whole world today in thanking you. This is indeed a good Friday." In addition to our Good Friday liturgy, we will also provide an opportunity to explore the STATIONS OF THE CROSS. Finally, our Triduum will conclude with the greatest celebration of the church year. EASTER SUNDAY, after experiencing the fullness of Christ's life and death throughout the week, will be filled with a peace that passes all understanding, joy that can't be contained, and the proclamation that Christ has indeed been raised.

I pray that you will join me in this journey through the triduum. If there was ever a time that the church placed weighty expectations on us, it would be now and for good reason. Easter means so much more when you know what Christ went through to get there.

Everyone's Way of the Cross

Noon on Good Friday

Please join Deacon Stacey on April 7 th for a devotional service commemorating the last journey of Christ from Pilate's house to his entombment. We will be engaging with the illuminated stations, created by our amazing J2A, in our sanctuary. We will gather in the atrium at 11:30. All that is needed is your heart. Booklets and comfort crosses will be available.

A Spiritual Invitation

As we enter the story of The Stations of The Cross, we are asked who do we want to be? Like Pilate? Like, Mary? Maybe John? Jesus asks us to help him carry the weight of the Cross. We will be reminded how we suffer with Jesus and Jesus suffers with us. And in turn, we are to look upon others with mercy and tenderness, especially those who are in need of Love. By walking in His footsteps, we demonstrate our willingness to take concrete action in the name of the One who is Love itself.

A Brief History

The custom of walking the Stations of the Cross came into usage in the Fifteenth Century as an outgrowth of the Christian Crusades to the Middle East. Pilgrims to the Holy Lands of the Middle East developed a custom of visiting the places sanctified by Christ's earthly life, particularly the path he took on Good Friday from his trial at Pilate's house to Golgotha, where he was crucified, and then on to the tomb of Joseph of Arimathea. Upon their return to their homes in Western Europe, the pilgrims continued their commemoration of Christ's Good Friday journey by processing within the confines of their own parish churches. Done with great devotion, the service is typified by a procession that stops, or makes its station, at places within the church that are usually marked by a simple wooden cross or a pictorial representation of the event being commemorated at each particular station.

The Return of the Youth Group Lock-In

In 2020 when all church programming came to a screeching halt, the adults were not the only people whose Christian Education Programs were interrupted. Now, in true trinitarian fashion, we resurrect our middle/senior high overnight retreat on the third year. Anyone grades 5-12 is welcome to join us in the parish hall on April 6th, Maundy Thursday at 4:30pm where we will meet, eat, worship, and partake in all sorts of overnight shenanigans at the church.


The Garden of Repose

February income is down versus last year, but is running higher YTD. This is primarily due to the large number of annual pledges prepaid fully in January. February expenses are about the same year over year and below budget, but are higher on a YTD basis. After satisfying several income transfer obligations, the February overall net should be about break even.

A couple of large February bills will push into next month (staff medical and property insurance), so March expenses are expected to be heavy. We also have a PPL liability building due to their internal issues with reading meters and billing manually, which hopefully will get resolved next month or following.

Lastly, as a result of a February Vestry resolution, approximately \$42k of unspecified memorial funds were transferred to our general, non-restricted investment account.

Report

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It's almost six months since we met our neighbors, the Abdi family, at the Lancaster Airport. Since then, we find the following as pertains to Dad (Bati), Mom (Halima) and their three children, Abdisa, Sutan, and Abdalla: (1) the family has a clean, safe, comfortable home at the church-owned property at 209 N. Concord; (2) the family has access to good medical and dental care; (3) Dad has a job that for now is able to support the family; (4) all children are in school; (5) a good part of the financial/administrative base – social security cards, other IDs, bank accounts – has been established. Church World Service (CWS), our partner in welcoming the family, is recognized for its commitment to helping refugees. Its matching grant program whereby credit is established for hours worked by Welcome Team members, has been very generous in its financial support for the Abdi family.

Yet, with successes have come some disappointments. While our welcome team held several sessions with CWS regarding what to expect and what types of assistance our team could provide, there was confusion during our preparation regarding who was doing what. These concerns were raised with CWS and they apologized for any lack of communication. While communication improved, we found that help in various areas we thought we were to provide had already been taken care of by CWS. We were pleased that CWS welcomed our suggestion that they "create and share a progress sheet with Welcome Teams which tracks what is being done by CWS and what is being done by the Welcome Team." Our hope is that such a system clearly outlining respective assignments will help future Welcome Teams.

Also hindering greater involvement by Welcome Team Members and neighbors is the fact that Bati works a night shift a considerable distance away and he leaves late afternoon and returns often after 4 am. We continue to look for employment closer and with more reasonable

hours. The family is very appreciative of all the support it receives from St. John's. Our plan is to schedule a Welcome Team meeting in the near future to develop, in light of what we've experienced, additional ways to promote the family's transition to the Lancaster area.
