Dear St. John's,

Spring is in full force, and I don't know about you, but I am loving the warmer temps, longer days, and the buzz of activity happening in our community. We are fully immersed in the great fifty days of Easter and before long we'll be preparing to celebrate the culmination of the Easter season with Pentecost on May 28 th. Pentecost is known as the birthday of the church. On Pentecost, we remember the gift of the Holy Spirit descending upon the very first Christian community empowering them, and us, to continue the ministry of Jesus in the world. It is a joyous celebration where we are reminded that we are one body in Christ. That oneness is what we as a parish strive for through worship, study, and service.

Peter Novosel

"God will take care of things."



A Healer looks back on a life of service



Someone once wrote, "When you are in the service of your fellow beings you are in the service of God." St. John's very own Peter Novosel is the epitome of serving God's people. Recently, I had the privilege and joy of spending time with Peter. He brought with him a manila envelope with a lifetime of pictures. Childhood, family, his first waiting room, all threaded together with memories of service, love, hope and God. I hope that you are blessed by Peter's story as much as I was and remember we never really know someone until we take the time to listen to their story. Saints walk among us!

Peter Steven Novosel was born an only child in 1946, 20 miles outside of Johnstown, Pennsylvania. It was a very rural area and Peter's father worked for a British owned coal mine.

What was the best and worst thing about your childhood?

The best was the country. The mountains were wonderful! There were 5 of us childhood friends, 4 boys and 1 girl and we would ride our bikes everywhere and never had to worry about anyone bothering us. The area was beautiful and we were always out in nature doing or watching something. We didn't have any fancy electronics, we had mother nature. The worst part was the mine itself. Coal mining is an industry that deserves to die. As kids we would know to go to the streams above the mine where the water was sweet and clear, not orange from the sulphur below the mine. The mine killed animals and people. My father had black lung. I knew many people who became sick as a result of the mines.



Is that why you decided to become a physician?

I decided to study medicine much later but I think God used that to influence me, yes. When I became a doctor, family practice was just emerging. It really attracted me.



Are there other careers that you would like to try?

Yes, I believe I would enjoy being an architect or a baker. I have lovely memories of my mother making fresh pies from berries we picked. I still enjoy making pies because it reminds me of her.

Who was the most influential person in your life?

Oh, that is a tough one! There were so many! I would have to say Father James Dannelley. He was the vicar of an Anglo Catholic parish I attended in Guadalajara Mexico.

Mexico? How on earth did you wind up attending services in Mexico?

Well, that is a bit of story. Are you sure you want to hear it?

Guadalajara, Mexico

I was attending New York Medical College, it was 1968. Protests against the Vietnam War were growing more frequent so, 14 of us students "liberated" some medical supplies from school and went down to where the protests were taking place. At the time, the police were very heavy handed with the protestors and beat them. This was about...oh...2 years before the students in Kent State were killed. Anyway, our plan was to position ourselves in the alley and help people who were hurt. We stitched them up, we did what we could considering all the violence and anger that was going on. Well, a NY Times reporter spotted us and took some pictures. We were wearing our medical white coats and the photograph caught our school insignia.

What is something you value? Sincerity. It is important to be sincere in all our relationships otherwise they simply will not work. Relationships are very important to me.

What relationship is most important to you at this time?

My daughter. We have a very special relationship. Jen and I talk at least 4 times a week for at least an hour and she doesn't have to do that. She lives in Vermont and is the director of a library that helps people. It is a landmark library and keeps her very busy but she doesn't let that or other things get in her way. She makes time for me and includes me in her life. Wipes away a tear. I am so proud of her and grateful for our relationship.

Gifts and contributions YTD through March are ahead of last year, but higher expenses have decreased our net income. March expenses were exceptionally heavy compared to an average budget month, due mostly to some February bills sliding into the March payment cycle. One notable exception is the real and dramatic increase in our water/sewer expenses, driven mostly by metered consumption. Property staff and committee members are investigating.

St John's received an \$8000 Shaped by Faith grant from the Diocese to support our resettlement program and partnership with Church World Service. We also received an anonymous \$6000 gift for our general operating fund in March.

Several new 2023 operating pledges were received in March, bringing the total amount pledged as of March 31 to \$402.9k with over 100 families participating.

As requested and approved by Vestry, the split between stipend and housing allowance of our Assistant Priest was adjusted effective March 31. Also approved by Vestry, securities valued at \$42.4k representing accumulated general memorial gifts were transferred to our unrestricted investment account on March 10.
