What a spectacular summer we had! Worshipping as one throughout June, July, and August was such a gift. There is something so life giving about worshiping in a full and vibrant church. I hope you met some new faces and enjoyed being together as much as I did! As much as I loved having one service, I know the value and importance of offering multiple worship services. We will return to our regular service times beginning Homecoming Sunday, September 10th ! Each service we offer is prayerfully and intentionally created and has its own unique style. Below is a description of each of our weekly services:

SUNDAY AT 8:00 A.M. HOLY EUCHARIST RITE I

Our 8:00 A.M. spoken service is for our early risers. Using the Rite I liturgy from the Book of Common Prayer, this service is contemplative in nature and invites one to pause and connect with God in the midst of a busy world. Throughout this traditional service, scripture is read, prayers offered, and Eucharist shared. The Rite I liturgy connects us to our roots and those who have gone before us through timeless prayers and the holy sacrament.

SUNDAY AT 10:15 A.M. HOLY EUCHARIST RITE II WITH CHOIR

Our Rite II service is filled with vibrant music, sacred scripture, and the breaking of bread. This service is filled with the joyful sound of children rustling in the pews, anthems sung to the glory of God, and the heartfelt prayers of those gathered. With acolytes and processions, communal singing, and a mission to love and serve our neighbors, this service invites one to participate in the coming of the Kingdom.

WEDNESDAY AT 12:05 P.M. HEALING SERVICE WITH HOLY EUCHARIST

Our Wednesday healing service is an invitation to lay before God the people and situations on our hearts in need of healing. This service, using the Book of Common Prayer and other resources, is grounded in healing prayers, anointing with holy oil, and the sharing of the sacrament. The service is short enough to accommodate lunch breaks yet full enough to transform hearts.

I have never met an Episcopal priest who didn't love the passage from Hebrews that reads, "Don't stop meeting together with other believers, which some people have gotten into the habit of doing. Instead, encourage each other, especially as you see the day drawing near." Worship has united Christ's disciples for thousands of years and is as important today as ever. Everything we do as Christians stems from our worship experiences, so invite a friend, pick your favorite service, and join others as we launch into a new program year at St. John's! I look forward to praising God with you in the weeks and months to come!

"God doesn't necessarily call the equipped, he equips the called." During my 30 plus years at St. John's, I've been asked a number of times to serve on the vestry. For much of that time, the meetings were held on Monday evenings, a night that was already committed, and so it was easy to say no. Besides, what could I contribute? Truth be told, serving on the vestry seemed a little intimidating. But when I was asked 3 years ago to consider serving and was reminded by the "asker" that with a new rector in place, this was an exciting time to be involved with shaping the vision for St. John's, I said yes!

During my term on the vestry, we have rebounded from being a "zoom" parish to full pews at worship. We have transformed the Concord Street property from a rental unit to a transitional housing space for refugee families. We have added an assistant rector and a communications minister, welcomed over 50 new members, expanded our outreach ministries, and have established ourselves as an affirming and welcoming congregation.

Currently, we are gearing up to address major infrastructure issues facing our beautiful, but aging worship space. All of these things are accomplished through the hard work and dedication of the entire parish, but with the guidance of those who say yes to being part of the lay leadership of St. Johns. Amanda and Jen are more excited than ever about what the coming year holds for St. John's and they are anxious to welcome fresh ideas from new vestry members. Over the next several weeks, current vestry members will be reaching out to parishioners asking for volunteers to serve a three-year term on St. John's Vestry. Please consider saying yes!

Feast of Saint Michael BLESSING OF THE BADGES

Please plan on joining Pastor Amanda and Sister Stacey in celebration of the Feast of St. Michael with the Blessing of the Badges. We will gather in the courtyard on Friday, Sept. 29th at 7:20 am and pick up coffee and baguettes as we walk down to the police station. Help us lift up those who protect our community with their lives.

On the 29th of September, Episcopalians observe the Feast of St. Michael and All Angels, commonly known as Michaelmas.

The biblical word "angel" (Greek: angelos) means, literally, a messenger. Messengers from God can be visible or invisible, and may assume human or non-human forms. Christians have always felt themselves to be attended by helpful spirits—swift, powerful, and enlightening. Those beneficent spirits are often depicted in Christian art in human form, with wings to signify their swiftness and spacelessness, with swords to signify their power, and with dazzling raiment to signify their ability to enlighten. Of the many angels spoken of in the Bible, only four are called by name: Michael, Gabriel, Uriel, and Raphael. The Archangel Michael is the powerful agent of God who wards off evil from God's people, and delivers peace to them at the end of this life's mortal struggle. "Michaelmas," as his feast is called in England, has long been one of the popular celebrations of the Christian Year in many parts of the world.

Michael is the patron saint of police officers, paramedics, and first responders; please join us as we bless the badges and the people who wear them in our city.

Everlasting God, you have ordained and constituted in a wonderful order the ministries of angels and mortals: Mercifully grant that, as your holy angels always serve and worship you in heaven, so by your appointment they may help and defend us here on earth; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. FOOD PANTRY

Our Food Pantry ministry helps to meet the needs of our neighbors who are experiencing food insecurity, and we see about 50 visitors each week.

Financial Status

We budgeted \$20,000 for 2023 (both expenses and contributions), and our spending (a bit over \$13,000 through mid-August) has fallen in line with that. However, we've received just under \$9,000 in Food Pantry contributions so far this year.

YARD GIVE

A Follow-Up

The 7th annual Yard Give was another smashing success! From the beginning, the motto has always been for our guests to "Take what you need; give what you can." This year, as before, we saw God's grace running throughout the event. Some of the shoppers are the typical yard sale regulars, looking for the diamond in the rough or the deal that they just can't live without. Some of the visitors were curious neighbors who welcomed an opportunity to visit the church in a way that was not intimidating to them. The largest group of shoppers, though, was a group of our neighbors in need, many of them shopping for themselves or others with limited fiscal means. At 6:30am on Friday, there was already a line of more than twenty people waiting to enter when the doors didn't open until 7:00am. For some people, they left with bags of clothes and household items and thanked us again and again for the blessings that they had received. Others brought us donations of things that they could give: a pack of paper, baby clothes that no longer fit, or a book they had read. Still others found a sense of pride in offering a dollar and being thanked for their gracious donation.

While the Yard Give did generate \$1,320.42 in income, its true impact will always be measured by the impact it has on the people of Lancaster, and the message of love and dignity that it spreads. Thank you for your generous support, and start saving your items for next year.

We have reached the income deficit period of the financial year and as such, we transferred \$30k from our endowment savings account to our operating fund in July. This transfer represents about half of the annual budgeted draw amount established by policy.

July expenses were higher than usual due to a one-time charge for pension contributions, an annual property tax payment for Concord, and continuing high demand for food pantry items. The \$15.3k proceeds from the Gratitude Dinner were also transferred from the operating fund to the restricted music investment account in July. The brick repointing work for both church and Concord was completed in July. Total cost of the project was \$15.3k of which \$11.6k will show up as August expenses.
