

Then God spoke all these words: I am the LORD your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery; you shall have no other gods before me.

You shall not make for yourself an idol, whether in the form of anything that is in heaven above, or that is on the earth beneath, or that is in the water under the earth. You shall not make wrongful use of the name of the LORD your God, for the LORD will not acquit anyone who misuses his name. Remember the sabbath day, and keep it holy. For six days you shall labour and do all your work. Honor your father and your mother, so that your days may be long in the land that the LORD your God is giving you. You shall not murder. You shall not commit adultery. You shall not steal. You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor. You shall not covet your neighbor's house; you shall not covet your neighbor's wife, or male or female slave, or ox, or donkey, or anything that belongs to your neighbor.

When all the people witnessed the thunder and lightning, the sound of the trumpet, and the mountain smoking, they were afraid and trembled and stood at a distance, and said to Moses, "You speak to us, and we will listen; but do not let God speak to us, or we will die." Moses said to the people, "Do not be afraid; for God has come only to test you and to put the fear of him upon you so that you do not sin."

PSALM 105:1-6, 37-45

- 1 The heavens declare the glory of God, * and the firmament shows his handiwork.
- 2 One day tells its tale to another, * and one night imparts knowledge to another.

- 4 Their sound has gone out into all lands, * and their message to the ends of the world.
- 5 In the deep has he set a pavilion for the sun; * it comes forth like a bridegroom out of his chamber; it rejoices like a champion to run its course.
- 6 It goes forth from the uttermost edge of the heavens and runs about to the end of it again; * nothing is hidden from its burning heat.

- 7 The law of the LORD is perfect and revives the soul; * the testimony of the LORD is sure and gives wisdom to the innocent.

THE EPISTLE: Philippians 3:4b-14

If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh, I have more: circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless.

Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but one that comes through faith in Christ, the righteousness from God based on faith. I want to know Christ and the power of his resurrection and the sharing of his sufferings by becoming like him in his death, if somehow I may attain the resurrection from the dead. Not that I have already obtained this or have already reached the goal; but I press on to make it my own, because Christ Jesus has made me his own. Beloved, I do not consider that I have made it my own; but this one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, I press on toward the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus.

THE HOLY GOSPEL: Matthew 21:33-46 (*please remain standing as you are able*)

CelebrantThe Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew.PeopleGlory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus said, "Listen to another parable. There was a landowner who planted a vineyard, put a fence around it, dug a wine press in it, and built a watchtower. Then he leased it to tenants and went to another country. When the harvest time had come, he sent his slaves to the tenants to collect his produce. But the tenants seized his slaves and beat one, killed another, and stoned another. Again he sent other slaves, more than the first; and they treated them in the same way. Finally he sent his son to them, saying, 'They will respect my son.' But when the tenants saw the son, they said to themselves, 'This is the heir; come, let us kill him and get his inheritance.' So they seized him, threw him out of the vineyard, and killed him. Now when the owner of the vineyard comes, what will he do to those tenants?" They said to him, "He will put those wretches to a miserable death, and lease the vineyard to other tenants who will give him the produce at the harvest time." Jesus said to them, "Have you never read in the scriptures: 'The stone that the builders rejected has become the cornerstone; this was the Lord's doing, and it is amazing in our eyes'? Therefore I tell you, the kingdom of God will be taken away from you and given to a people that produces the fruits of the kingdom. The one who falls on this stone will be broken to pieces; and it will crush anyone on whom it falls." When the chief priests and the Pharisees heard his parables, they realized that he was speaking about them. They wanted to arrest him, but they feared the crowds, because they regarded him as a prophet.

He ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again to judge the living and the dead.

We thank you, Almighty God, for the gift of water. Over it the Holy Spirit moved in the beginning of creation. Through it you led the children of Israel out of their bondage in Egypt into the land of promise. In it your Son Jesus received the baptism of John and was anointed by the Holy Spirit as the Messiah, the Christ, to lead us, through his death and resurrection, from the bondage of sin into everlasting life.

We thank you, Father, for the water of Baptism. In it we are buried with Christ in his death. By it we share in his resurrection. Through it we are reborn by the Holy Spirit. Therefore in joyful obedience to your Son, we bring into his fellowship those who come to him in faith, baptizing them in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

Now sanctify this water, we pray you, by the power of your Holy Spirit, that those who here are cleansed from sin and born again may continue for ever in the risen life of Jesus Christ our Savior. To him, to you, and to the Holy Spirit, be all honor and glory, now and for ever. *Amen*.



St. John's Traveler Letter:

Did you know St. John's has a team of pilgrims who travel every week to the very places we pray for in the Anglican communion? Follow John as he shares a little bit about the church and the places he visits:

Dia duit, Pastor Amanda,

May God be with you! As fabulous as it is, there's much more to the Republic of Ireland than Dublin, and I'm writing to you today from the home of friends here in Sligo on the northwest coast. It's a lovely port town on the Garavogue River, surrounded by hills and fields, with a lot of outdoor activities from hiking to horseback riding, sailing in Sligo Bay of course, and fishing for the abundant seafood. Oh, and pubs and music. Anyone traveling to Ireland would do well to visit Sligo.

The Church of Ireland has a history that's as long as the histories of Ireland and England. If you've seen an Irish fisherman's cable sweater (jumper, over here), you'll get a visual idea of the intertwining story of this church. Christianity came to Ireland in the mid 400's with the well known St. Patrick. He remains one of the three patron saints of Ireland, along with St. Columba or Colmcille, and St. Brigid. In those early days Ireland was predominantly Catholic. The English Reformation brought change and the creation of the Church of England, and in 1536 the Irish Parliament accepted King Henry VIII of England as the head of the Church of Ireland rather than the Pope in Rome. Successor kings and queens had their own personal leanings toward or away from the Catholic Church, and Irish worship was swayed that way or this, just as you might follow the cables winding their way through our sweater.

This was also a fascinating time of theological thought. As the Renaissance moved into what we now call the Age of Enlightenment in the mid 1600's, many people were interested in the developing theories of science. Sometimes then, just as it does now, science seemed to conflict with the biblical teachings of the church. A personal hero of mine was James Ussher, Archbishop of Armagh Ireland from 1625 to 1656. In an effort to unify scientific thought with biblical scripture, he famously (or infamously) traced back through the lineages, generations, and epochs cited in the Bible and calculated the date of Creation as October 22, 4004 B.C. In hindsight it turns out his result wasn't accurate, but he gave it a good try with the intent of reconciling science and faith. And it's a reconciliation that continues to confound people even today. It seems the more we learn about the universe through scientific study, the more wondrous it is. I for one will continue to praise God for the wonder of Creation, here, there, and everywhere, throughout time, and for time everlasting yet to come. And I'll raise a glass to Archbishop Ussher on the 22nd.

With the road rising up to meet me and the wind at my back, I wish you blessings always, John Traveler
