THE FIRST LESSON: Deuteronomy 34:1-12 (please be seated)

Moses went up from the plains of Moab to Mount Nebo, to the top of Pisgah, which is opposite Jericho, and the Lord showed him the whole land: Gilead as far as Dan, all Naphtali, the land of Ephraim and Manasseh, all the land of Judah as far as the Western Sea, the Negeb, and the Plain—that is, the valley of Jericho, the city of palm trees—as far as Zoar. The Lord said to him, "This is the land of which I swore to Abraham, to Isaac, and to Jacob, saying, 'I will give it to your descendants'; I have let you see it with your eyes, but you shall not cross over there." Then Moses, the servant of the Lord, died there in the land of Moab, at the Lord's command. He was buried in a valley in the land of Moab, opposite Beth-peor, but no one knows his burial place to this day. Moses was one hundred twenty years old when he died; his sight was unimpaired and his vigor had not abated. The Israelites wept for Moses in the plains of Moab thirty days; then the period of mourning for Moses was ended. Joshua son of Nun was full of the spirit of wisdom, because Moses had laid his hands on him; and the Israelites obeyed him, doing as the Lord had commanded Moses. Never since has there arisen a prophet in Israel like Moses, whom the Lord knew face to face. He was unequaled for all the signs and wonders that the Lord sent him to perform in the land of Egypt, against Pharaoh and all his servants and his entire land, and for all the mighty deeds and all the terrifying displays of power that Moses performed in the sight of all Israel.

THE EPISTLE: 1 Thessalonians 2:1-8

You yourselves know, brothers and sisters, that our coming to you was not in vain, but though we had already suffered and been shamefully mistreated at Philippi, as you know, we had courage in our God to declare to you the gospel of God in spite of great opposition. For our appeal does not spring from deceit or impure motives or trickery, but just as we have been approved by God to be entrusted with the message of the gospel, even so we speak, not to please mortals, but to please God who tests our hearts. As you know and as God is our witness, we never came with words of flattery or with a pretext for greed; nor did we seek praise from mortals, whether from you or from others, though we might have made demands as apostles of Christ. But we were gentle among you, like a nurse tenderly caring for her own children. So deeply do we care for you that we are determined to share with you not only the gospel of God but also our own selves, because you have become very dear to us.

When the Pharisees heard that Jesus had silenced the Sadducees, they gathered together, and one of them, a lawyer, asked him a question to test him. SERMON

St. John's Traveler Letter:

Connecting to our siblings in Christ across the world Did you know St. John's has a team of pilgrims who travel every week to the very places we pray for in the Anglican communion? Follow John as he shares a little bit about the church and the places he visits:

Dear Pastor Amanda,

Have you ever been driving around and found yourself in a town and thought, I didn't know this is where this is? Well, greetings from Vanuatu. Try to find it on a world map. Hint: it's sort of near Australia, but actually not near much of anything. Vanuatu is a collection of small islands and, while it can be beautiful, the people here are some of the first to be affected by climate change. The news has stories of rising sea water temperatures, and I know people in Lancaster don't immediately see the impact of that. Here though, rising sea water temperatures means melting ice caps and actual rising sea water levels. Recently six villages had to be relocated because the rising sea water has infiltrated the fresh water springs inland on the islands, and the people in those villages lost their clean drinking water supplies. We have the advantages of world-wide news coverage and communication. Imagine if the people living here didn't know what was going on in the rest of the world, or the science behind theories of climate change. The rising sea levels may be recorded as stories we read from the Old Testament of floods and plagues as coming from God's judgment.

Vanuatu is connected to the larger world wide community, and the Anglican Church here is part of the Province of Melanesia. We worship from the same Book of Common Prayer, although it's translated into many different languages. And just like any family or community, there are differences of opinion and belief. This Province belongs to a branch of the Anglican family known as the Global South, and they are quite different than the churches in the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania. The Global South began to organize among churches that do not accept the sanctity of same gender marriages, and they do not allow LGBTQ+ clergy. However, it's a testament to the Archbishop of Canterbury and all the Presiding Bishops that have worked to hold the Anglican Communion together rather than splintering off each time there's a serious disagreement of faith. We are all one family of different people, different beliefs, and different issues affecting our everyday lives. We all care for each other. As one family, the people here appreciate your prayers for them today, and they will pray for you. Let us all live healthy lives in Peace.
