RECTOR'S MESSAGE

Amanda+

"Do not be dismayed by the brokenness in the world. All things break. And all things can be mended. Not with time, as they say but with intention. So go. Love intentionally, extravagantly, unconditionally.

The broken world waits in darkness for the light that is you." – L.R. Knost

Dear St. John's Parish Family,

The quote on the left by L.R. Knost has become my daily mantra as of late. Every morning, I find myself watching the news, a cup of hot coffee in my hand, my eyes barely open, with kids and dogs vying for my attention, and without fail, my phone dings, and this message pops up on my screen. Do not be dismayed by the brokeness in the world...

When I first began the practice of reading this each morning, I thought, "Yeah, right. Have you seen the brokeness of the world, L.R. Knost? How in God's holy name do we not be dismayed by war, senseless gun violence, political upheaval, poverty, the earth on fire, and every other broken situation surrounding us?!? Who is L.R. Knost anyway?" Like any good critic, I did some digging on this person and discovered L.R. Knost isn't someone of the past who lived in a convent somewhere, completely removed from society. L.R. Knost is a middle aged woman living in Florida. She's a social justice advocate, cancer warrior, mom of six, and a children's rights advocate. She knows brokeness. She knows suffering. She also knows hope and the power of light that resides in each of us. She knows what's possible when people choose love in the midst of the brokeness.

The broken world waits in darkness for the light that IS YOU. That line gets me every single morning. Friends, we have a role to play in healing this broken world because light heals – YOUR light heals. When we love as Christ loves, when we are extravagant in our giving, unconditional in our caring, the darkness slowly fades away and healing happens. I know the brokeness of the world can feel overwhelming and impossible, but may I remind us all that God doesn't believe in the impossible. God believes in resurrection, and reconciliation, and a new way of being that is centered on community and compassion. God believes in the light that you hold because God gave it to you. God just asks that we let it burn bright for the world to see.

Wherever you are in your faith journey, and however you view the world, I encourage you to consider L.R. Knost's holy words as an invitation to share your own God given light with the world around you. The healing of our neighbors, our nation, our world depend on it.

Is it appropriate?


An Expression of Personal Experience:

Often times in a church service, we feel the need to separate performance from worship, and rightly so! What we do on Sunday mornings is all for the glory of God, and our focus should reflect this praise.

However, you may also feel at times the desire to encourage a particular encounter by affirming that you have heard through sound; a common response to a meaningful sermon might be an audible "Amen!" from the congregation--ask Ruth McFarland what she thinks of being vocal in church!

It seems that we have been passed down a tradition of silence being the surest form of respect and holiness in a church service. Perhaps we feel that we don't want to interrupt the spiritual experiences of those around us by simply enjoying and taking in what we hear quietly. Indeed, the tone in a church service can often feel like a Library!

I would argue that while silence is respectful and retains nothing innately wrong, it also tends to isolate: by remaining silent, our focus can become that of conformity to a standard that keeps us from joining together in celebration and freely expressing our excitement and joy at what we have experienced in the house of God. How many Psalms speak of making a joyful noise unto the Lord, singing and playing of instruments, banging on the drum...even the rocks shall cry out in praise to our God!



As such, I do not wish to write to you today condemning silence at the finish of a music anthem or an electric sermon from Jen; more so I am writing this to encourage an environment of audible involvement with your spiritual experience in the church setting. By clapping in church, you yourself are becoming part of the very praise you have witnessed.

Therefore, do not be afraid to praise the Lord in silence or in sound! St. John's is a place where the people are welcomed to meet God where they are!

So I say again: Make a Joyful Noise unto the Lord Our God!





We had a \$17.5k operating deficit in September but were able to manage without a withdrawal from our investment account. We will draw \$21.5k in October to provide a cash cushion, which still leaves another \$12.1k available in the budget to complete the year. Our YTD operating deficit is \$13.4k. Given our current income and expense projections, we expect to complete the year with a smaller deficit than the \$35.0k budgeted.

Also in September, fees for our Fulton operating account were renegotiated without affecting service for a savings of about \$60 per month. Our brokerage service, previously provided by TDAmeritrade, has been moved over to Schwab as a result of Schwab's earlier acquisition of TDA. Lastly, we received our preprinted 2024 pledge envelopes ahead of schedule.


