THE HOLY GOSPEL: John 1:1-18 (please remain standing as you are able)

Celebrant The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it. There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world. He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him. He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God. And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth. (John testified to him and cried out, "This was he of whom I said, 'He who comes after me ranks ahead of me because he was before me.") From his fullness we have all received, grace upon grace. The law indeed was given through Moses; grace and truth came through Jesus Christ. No one has ever seen God. It is God the only Son, who is close to the Father's heart, who has made him known.

We remember his death, We proclaim his resurrection, We await his coming in glory;


And we offer our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving to you, O Lord of all; presenting to you, from your creation, this bread and this wine.



The "Sussex Carol" is a Christmas carol popular in Britain, sometimes referred to by its first line "On Christmas night all Christians sing". Its words were first published by Luke Wadding, a 17th-century Irish bishop, in a work called Small Garland of Pious and Godly Songs (1684). It is unclear whether Wadding wrote the song or was recording an earlier composition. Both the text and the tune to which it is now sung were discovered and written down by Cecil Sharp in Buckland, Gloucestershire, and Ralph Vaughan Williams, who heard it being sung by a Harriet Verrall of Monk's Gate, near Horsham, Sussex (hence "Sussex Carol"). The tune to which it is generally sung today is the one Vaughan Williams took down from Mrs. Verrall and published in 1919.

St. John's Traveler Letter:

Did you know St. John's has a team of pilgrims who travel every week to the very places we pray for in the Anglican communion? Follow John as he shares a little bit about the church and the places he visits:

Dear Pastor Amanda,

This week, I'm writing to you from Rwanda, a small country in east Africa, on the shores of Lake Kivu. The sun is setting for the final time of 2023 in this "land of a thousand hills" tucked between the Democratic Republic of the Congo on one side and Tanzania on the other.

As I sit here, I'm thinking about how New Year's Eve has always been an interesting time for me – it's the end of a calendar year but just the beginning of the church year. In keeping with this spirit, it gives me the opportunity to reflect on the past and look forward to the future.

Looking back, this is my 53rd and final letter of 2023. I've visited 41 different countries this year and spoken with hundreds of people around the world. Since I began my travels, no two weeks have been the same. I've celebrated Dia de los Muertos in Mexico, took sewing lessons in Malawi, went shopping in Zanzibar, and helped rebuild homes in Pakistan. Just earlier this week, I cheered for the national cycling team in a local race here in Rwanda.

Despite the changes from week to week, the one thing that remains the same is my commitment to sharing my travels with you all at St. John's. In a world where bad news tops the headlines, I hope my stories are able to share a different side of this big, messy, beautiful world we all share. Despite the world's challenges, there's a whole lot more that brings us together than drives us apart.

Looking ahead, I want to continue to share these stories with you, including the story of soccer team here in a Kigali, the capital. Thirty years ago, a terrible event called the Rwandan Genocide led to the killing of many Rwandan Tutsi people by the Hutu ethnic group. Despite this awful shared history, both Tutsi and Hutu now play together on this soccer team and promote peace and unity throughout the country. Now that's powerful!

It gives me hope looking toward 2024 to find more stories like this around the world to share with you at St. John's. I'm hoping you all had a blessed Christmas and look forward to an equally blessed new year.
