Celebrant The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. This is the testimony given by John when the Jews sent priests and Levites from Jerusalem to ask him, "Who are you?" He confessed and did not deny it, but confessed, "I am not the Messiah." And they asked him, "What then? Are you Elijah?" He said, "I am not." "Are you the prophet?" He answered, "No." Then they said to him, "Who are you? Let us have an answer for those who sent us. What do you say about yourself?" He said, "I am the voice of one crying out in the wilderness, 'Make straight the way of the Lord," as the prophet Isaiah said. Now they had been sent from the Pharisees. They asked him, "Why then are you baptizing if you are neither the Messiah, nor Elijah, nor the prophet?" John answered them, "I baptize with water. Among you stands one whom you do not know, the one who is coming after me; I am not worthy to untie the thong of his sandal." This took place in Bethany across the Jordan where John was baptizing.

SERMON THE REV. STACEY CATIGANO

THE NICENE CREED (please rise in body or spirit)

It is customary to kneel during Advent.

We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In him, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

On the night before he died for us, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore, according to his command, O Father,

We remember his death, We proclaim his resurrection, We await his coming in glory;

And we offer our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving to you, O Lord of all; presenting to you, from your creation, this bread and this wine.

We pray you, gracious God, to send your Holy Spirit upon these gifts that they may be the Sacrament of the Body of Christ and his Blood of the new Covenant. Unite us to your Son in his sacrifice, that we may be acceptable through him, being sanctified by the Holy Spirit. In the fullness of time, put all things in subjection under your Christ, and bring us to that heavenly country where, with St. John all your saints, we may enter the everlasting heritage of your sons and daughters; through Jesus Christ our Lord, the firstborn of all creation, the head of the Church, and the author of our salvation.

By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. **AMEN.**

St. John's Traveler Letter:

Did you know St. John's has a team of pilgrims who travel every week to the very places we pray for in the Anglican communion? Follow John as he shares a little bit about the church and the places he visits:

Dear Pastor Amanda,

I have to admit, while the sunny blue skies are nice here in the South Pacific nation of Papua New Guinea, I do miss the winter weather during this Advent period of waiting ahead of Christmas. Word on the street is that you all got your first snow in Lancaster!

I almost didn't make it here – a large explosion of the Ulawun volcano last month is still spewing smoke and causing some small earthquakes across the country. It made for an interesting landing in the capitol of Port Moresby – thankfully the pilot knew what she was doing and we landed with no trouble.

I spent my first day in this island country (just north of Australia) in a cathedral in the town of Dogura. It's the largest cathedral in the country and was completed just a few years before the outbreak of World War II. A year after the war began, the Japanese invaded and occupied the country. Over the course of their occupation, more than 300 church workers of all denominations, including eight Anglican clergy and missionaries, were killed. We remember these "New Guinea Martyrs" and the sacrifices they made ever September 2.

We also spent some time earlier this week helping some villages rebuild that were damaged by the volcano explosion. I was shocked to find a small Anglican congregation – that's what we call Episcopalians here – living here, including a 90 year old woman who had memories of the war. She described the fear faced by some of those church messengers back in the 1940s, but also their determination in making sure that the Word of God remained burning bright during terrible times.

It's the resilience of that village and the spirit of the New Guinea Martyrs that's driving me forward as we approach the most holy season of the church calendar. Wishing you peace and blessings during this busy time from sunny Papua New Guinea!
