

THE EPISTLE: 1 Corinthians 8:1-13

Now concerning food sacrificed to idols: we know that "all of us possess knowledge." Knowledge puffs up, but love builds up. Anyone who claims to know something does not yet have the necessary knowledge; but anyone who loves God is known by him.

Hence, as to the eating of food offered to idols, we know that "no idol in the world really exists," and that "there is no God but one." Indeed, even though there may be so-called gods in heaven or on earth—as in fact there are many gods and many lords—yet for us there is one God, the Father, from whom are all things and for whom we exist, and one Lord, Jesus Christ, through whom are all things and through whom we exist.

It is not everyone, however, who has this knowledge. Since some have become so accustomed to idols until now, they still think of the food they eat as food offered to an idol; and their conscience, being weak, is defiled. "Food will not bring us close to God." We are no worse off if we do not eat, and no better off if we do. But take care that this liberty of yours does not somehow become a stumbling block to the weak. For if others see you, who possess knowledge, eating in the temple of an idol, might they not, since their conscience is weak, be encouraged to the point of eating food sacrificed to idols? So by your knowledge those weak believers for whom Christ died are destroyed. But when you thus sin against members of your family, and wound their conscience when it is weak, you sin against Christ. Therefore, if food is a cause of their falling, I will never eat meat, so that I may not cause one of them to fall.

They were astounded at his teaching, for he taught them as one having authority, and not as the scribes. I know who you are, the Holy One of God." But Jesus rebuked him, saying, "Be silent, and come out of him!" And the unclean spirit, convulsing him and crying with a loud voice, came out of him. They were all amazed, and they kept on asking one another, "What is this? A new teaching—with authority! He commands even the unclean spirits, and they obey him." At once his fame began to spread throughout the surrounding region of Galilee.

We remember his death, We proclaim his resurrection, We await his coming in glory;


And we offer our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving to you, O Lord of all; presenting to you, from your creation, this bread and this wine.



Carl Philipp Emanuel Bach (8 March 1714 – 14 December 1788), also formerly spelled Karl Philipp Emmanuel Bach, and commonly abbreviated C. P. E. Bach, was a German Classical period composer and musician, the fifth child and second surviving son of Johann Sebastian Bach and Maria Barbara Bach. C. P. E. Bach was an influential composer working at a time of transition between his father's Baroque style and the Classical style that followed it. His personal approach, an expressive and often turbulent one known as empfindsamer Stil or 'sensitive style', applied the principles of rhetoric and drama to musical structures. His dynamism stands in deliberate contrast to the more mannered galant style also then in vogue.

St. John's Traveler Letter:

Did you know St. John's has a team of pilgrims who travel every week to the very places we pray for in the Anglican communion? Follow John as he shares a little bit about the church and the places he visits:

Dear Pastor Amanda.

If you were to put a pin in a map for each place I travel and connect Lancaster to those pins with string you'd see a certain type of connection we have with our worldwide Anglican community. This week's letter draws a different form of connection, this one through personal relationships brought together by the Holy Spirit. I'm on my journey in South Africa, and one can hardly think of or write about South Africa without Bishop Desmond Tutu. Anglican priest, and political and civil rights activist. Nobel Peace Prize winner in 1984 for his work challenging apartheid, at a time when that White-ruled system of racial separation was in full force. The next year he was installed as Johannesburg's first Black Anglican Bishop, and the year after that he was elected to be the first Black Archbishop of Cape Town South Africa. Tutu is often spoken of in common terms with Mahatma Gandhi and Martin Luther King, Jr. Extraordinary person, and there is a personal connection to Central Pennsylvania. You may remember that Bishop Tutu spoke in Harrisburg at the consecration of Nathan Baxter as the Bishop of the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania in 2006. Many of us were there. Even closer to home, Bishop Tutu gave an address at McCaskey High School in 1998 in support of an endowment fund to start the Lancaster Seminary's Nathan Baxter Lectureship in African American Studies. They had come to know and respect each other, and it was a grand honor they supported each other's work and ministry. One more yet closer point of connection of course, is that many will recall the story of Nathan's time studying at Lancaster Seminary when, on a Christmas Eve night, he was walking through town looking for a church to attend and he happened upon St. John's. The late night Christmas Eve service was full to almost standing room only, but he found a seat in the raised back corner of the sanctuary where you used to keep the baptismal font, and it was on that night in your congregation that he was called to the Episcopal Church. Just as Mark will tell us on Sunday that those in the synagogue heard the Word of God from Jesus, Nathan heard it along with us. And so it is that from your pew at St. John's in Lancaster we are all connected through Nathan and Desmond to our brothers and sisters here in South Africa. Bishop Tutu directed Nathan at his consecration, "God is calling you to tell my children that God loves them. You are to be generous and magnanimous because you are precious to him." We are indeed all loved. Join me in prayer today to connect all God's precious souls, here in South Africa and there in Lancaster, in the love that God gives upon us.
