St. John's Traveler Letters: Explained!

Every week we pray for a church or province in the Anglican Communion. You may be wondering what is the Anglican Communion and why do we pray for a different place every week????

One of the best parts of being an Episcopalian is knowing that we belong to something bigger than just our parish. We are part of a worldwide movement, known as the Anglican Communion!

The Anglican Communion is an association of churches that are in full communion with the Church of England, and specifically with the Archbishop of Canterbury. We are the third largest Christian communion in the world. In the United States we all ourselves "Episcopal" to reflect our structure under the authority of a Bishop. However, we are both Episcopal and Anglican.


Each church in the communion has its own way of doing things and doctrines (that's a fancy word for a set of beliefs), but all are based primarily on that of England. Our worship and ministries allow for the inclusion of local customs, cultures, and traditions.

The Archbishop of Canterbury is the religious head of the Church of England and recognized as the symbolic head of the worldwide Anglican Communion. The Anglican Communion considers itself to be part of the "One, Holy, Catholic, and Apostolic Church" and to be both Catholic and Reformed. We are what we like to call the "via media" or the middle way between Catholicism and Protestantism

You can travel to any Anglican church in the world and follow along in the service because we all use a similar worship order and components. There are prayers, scripture readings, holy communion, blessings, and dismissals. Even when spoken in other languages, you would recognize the different parts of the service by when you stand, kneel, or sit!

St. John's travelers go on adventures each week to worship in the very places we pray for and then write me letters to share about their experiences. These letters are meant to connect us to our siblings around the world who are worshiping and serving God just like we do here in Lancaster.

We hope these letters help you connect to others striving to follow Jesus and open your heart to the beauty, depth, and power of belonging to a church that stretches around the world!




#### Netflix

Jonathan Kuttab is a co-founder of the Palestinian human rights group Al-Haq and co-founder of Nonviolence International. A well-known international human rights attorney, Jonathan practices in the US, Palestine and Israel. He serves on the Board of Bethlehem Bible College and is President of the Board of Holy Land Trust. Jonathan was the head of the Legal Committee negotiating the Cairo Agreement of 1994 between Israel and the PLO. After graduating with his Doctor of Jurisprudence (JD) from Virginia Law School, and practicing a couple years on Wall Street, Jonathan returned home to Palestine. Jonathan is currently the executive director of Friends of Sabeel North America (FOSNA). Jonathan is a resident of East Jerusalem, and is a partner of Kuttab, Khoury and Hanna Law Firm in East Jerusalem.

The General Convention of The Episcopal Church approved resolution 2022-B004, "Foundation of Religious Life Sunday," to be commemorated each year on the 3<sup>rd</sup> Sunday of Epiphany. The purpose of this observance is to share with all Episcopalians the existence of vowed religious orders and Christian communities, their residential and dispersed ways of life, and what resources and support they have to offer.

Over the last few years, the St. John's Food Pantry has grown from serving about 36 families a month to serving about 60 families a week. While there are a few more volunteers than in years past, we are at a time when we need a few more people with flexible schedules to help. We are fortunate to have a cadre of shoppers who seek out the best prices from various sources. We need donation collectors who will get the needed items when they are needed and available and help store them at the church. Right now, we receive food from the Central Pennsylvania Food Bank, Blessings of Hope, Sacred Heart Catholic Church, Lidl, Aldi, Weis, and Westfield Egg Farm of New Holland. Each of these sources offers particular advantages and restrictions.

The Central Pennsylvania Food Bank has a distribution point at the Golden Triangle. Most deliveries are on Thursdays at 8:30 AM. Debbie Carter is the coordinator. She can be contacted at dpcarterpa@verizon.net. Blessings of Hope offers us food at \$0.31/pound. This is our primary source for rice and pasta. However, when they have rice, our volunteers have to pick it up and repack it on site. Debbie Smith is the coordinator. She can be contacted at deboston@aol.com. Sacred Heart receives food donations from their parishioners. The church used to operate its own pantry. We have a volunteer who gets it, but we could use a backup. Tim Huber is the coordinator. He can be contacted at tjhuberlaw@outlook.com.

Aldi has canned goods and cereal at reasonable prices. Our shoppers lookout for sales. We need volunteers, especially those with a large truck as sometimes multiple trucks are needed. Lidl does large orders. Our volunteers need to be there in the middle of the day as Lidl requires the Store Manager to be available. Again, a large truck would be most helpful. Weis is our primary source for tuna fish. Our shoppers look out for sales on other food items. Pickups are on Tuesdays. Westfield Egg Farm of New Holland delivers 30 dozen eggs each week. Our volunteers are needed in order to put the eggs into containers of one-half dozen each. Sorting is done on Mondays at 1:00 We need help when large orders are delivered to the church by the donation collectors so that the food can be stored in an orderly manner.

Our key need is these donation collectors with a flexible schedule. Right now, our volunteers are doing magnificent work in our name. We need a few more people to help out as the need just keeps on growing. If you can help with any of the tasks described above, not only will our current volunteers be grateful, but the recipients will be grateful. Operating income was very strong in November resulting in a significant surplus. Several key items include a \$12.1k draw from our restricted investment account (the annual budgeted amount) and \$7.5k from Martha's ministry (holiday bazaar). The final resolution and distribution from the Martin Everett trust also occurred in November. Although these funds are booked as operating ("pass through") income, they will be transferred to one of our investment savings accounts in December per Vestry instructions. Expenses were routine for the month, and given the favorable YTD financials, it is likely we will complete the year much ahead of budget.
