

Llanfairpwllgwyngyll, or Llanfair Pwllgwyngyll (Welsh: [łan.ˌvair.pulˈgwi̞n.gɨ̞l]), is a large village and community on the Isle of Anglesey, Wales. It is located on the Menai Strait, next to the Britannia Bridge. At the 2011 Census the population was 3,107, of whom 71% could speak Welsh. It is the sixth largest settlement in the county by population. In some contexts the name of the community is lengthened to Llanfair-pwllgwyngyllgogerychwyrndrobwllllantysiliogogogoch. With 58 characters split into 18 syllables, it is purported to be the longest place name in Europe and the second longest one-word place name in the world.

THE FIRST LESSON: 2 Kings 2:1-12 (please be seated)

When the Lord was about to take Elijah up to heaven by a whirlwind, Elijah and Elisha were on their way from Gilgal. Elijah said to Elisha, "Stay here; for the Lord has sent me as far as Bethel." But Elisha said, "As the Lordlives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So they went down to Bethel. The company of prophets who were in Bethel came out to Elisha, and said to him, "Do you know that today the Lord will take your master away from you?" And he said, "Yes, I know; keep silent." Elijah said to him, "Elisha, stay here; for the Lord has sent me to Jericho." But he said, "As the Lord lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So they came to Jericho. The company of prophets who were at Jericho drew near to Elisha, and said to him, "Do you know that today the Lord will take your master away from you?" And he answered, "Yes, I know; be silent."

Then Elijah said to him, "Stay here; for the Lord has sent me to the Jordan." But he said, "As the Lord lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So the two of them went on. Fifty men of the company of prophets also went, and stood at some distance from them, as they both were standing by the Jordan. Then Elijah took his mantle and rolled it up, and struck the water; the water was parted to the one side and to the other, until the two of them crossed on dry ground.

When they had crossed, Elijah said to Elisha, "Tell me what I may do for you, before I am taken from you." Elisha said, "Please let me inherit a double share of your spirit." He responded, "You have asked a hard thing; yet, if you see me as I am being taken from you, it will be granted you; if not, it will not." As they continued walking and talking, a chariot of fire and horses of fire separated the two of them, and Elijah ascended in a whirlwind into heaven. Elisha kept watching and crying out, "Father, father! The chariots of Israel and its horsemen!" But when he could no longer see him, he grasped his own clothes and tore them in two pieces.

Jesus took with him Peter and James and John, and led them up a high mountain apart, by themselves. And he was transfigured before them, and his clothes became dazzling white, such as no one on earth could bleach them. And there appeared to them Elijah with

Moses, who were talking with Jesus. Then Peter said to Jesus, "Rabbi, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah." He did not know what to say, for they were terrified. Then a cloud overshadowed them, and from the cloud there came a voice, "This is my Son, the Beloved; listen to him!" Suddenly when they looked around, they saw no one with them any more, but only Jesus. As they were coming down the mountain, he ordered them to tell no one about what they had seen, until after the Son of Man had risen from the dead.

SERMON

We remember his death, We proclaim his resurrection, We await his coming in glory;


And we offer our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving to you, O Lord of all; presenting to you, from your creation, this bread and this wine.

From the "Occasional Oratoria" arr. Franklin Ritter

An Occasional Oratorio (HWV 62) is an oratorio by George Frideric Handel, based upon a libretto by Newburgh Hamilton after the poetry of John Milton and Edmund Spenser. The work was written in the midst of the Jacobite rising of 1745–1746, the attempt to overthrow Handel's patrons – the Hanoverian monarchy under George II – and replace them with a Stuart restoration under Charles Edward Stuart. The Occasional Oratorio is unique among Handel's works which he labelled "oratorio" in that it does not tell a story or contain elements of a drama, but was intended as a defiant and patriotic rallying piece.

St. John's Traveler Letter:

Did you know St. John's has a team of pilgrims who travel every week to the very places we pray for in the Anglican communion? Follow John as he shares a little bit about the church and the places he visits:

Dear Pastor Amanda,

This week, the last Sunday after Epiphany, finds me in Africa, specifically in South Sudan. My visit overlapped a courtesy visit by the American Ambassador, Michael Adler, making for a busy week for the office of the Primate.

A quick look at the map shows South Sudan as a landlocked African country, north of Uganda and west of Ethiopia. (though a river runs through it - The White Nile). After years of civil war, South Sudan officially split from Sudan in 2011 though it remains on high alert for violence and cattle raids.

South Sudan is considered to be one of the poorest countries throughout the world which is not initially evident upon arrival to its capital of Juba. A new airport, paved roads, and bustling town feels like a place of prosperity. However, Juba is also the youngest capital in world and the rush to refresh the infrastructure have created a deep division of rich and poor, as well as deep pockets of corruption. Let us pray for the balance of resources for all the people of South Sudan.

I was moved to hear how Juba is a land of "incomers." People coming from rural South Sudan as well as neighboring countries, to seek out riches and opportunity. There are parallels to what we see in our own country though at a different scale of publicity. The people of South Sudan feel forgotten. How often do each of us seek to belong and to be seen? To provide for our families? To not be hungry?

To seek and to be seen. This is our prayer for this young country whose biodiversity abounds in its diverse biomes and yet whose people lack potable water and accessible education.
