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

# Dear St. John's,

In just a few short weeks, we will embark on our annual Lenten journey. Beginning with Ash Wednesday, (this year falling on Valentine's Day!), Lent is a season for intentional reflection and repentance. For forty days, we are invited to remember our mortality, to wrestle with the sacrifice Christ made on our behalf, and to journey with Jesus through his passion and crucifixion. Lent is critical for anyone who desires to follow in the footsteps of Jesus.

The forty days of Lent are taken from Jesus' forty days spent in the wilderness following his baptism. It was in the desert that Jesus wrestled with the tempter. It was there that Christ leaned into his relationship with his Father and gave us an example of what turning towards God can look like. Jesus trusted in God during those forty days—through scripture, prayer, and fasting. As a community, we turn towards God each year through our own spiritual practices. We repent, we pray, we fast by giving up something or even by taking on something, we give of ourselves, our resources, our hearts. And we study.

I hope you will take advantage of this opportunity and explore with others the forgiveness, grace, and love Jesus extends through his passion and death.

# Souper Bowl of Caring - Messenger February 2024

Do you like soup on a cold winter day? Would you like to help our neighbors?

Most of us are aware that a football game is being played on February 11. Years ago, the Souper Bowl of Caring started at a church in South Carolina with a simple prayer: "Lord, even as we enjoy the Super Bowl football game, help us be mindful of those who are without a bowl of soup to eat." This prayer has inspired a youth-led movement to help hungry and hurting people around the world. Our youth have adopted this program to support our St. John's Food Pantry ministry, which serves the needs of our Lancaster neighbors.

On "Souper Bowl" Sunday, our youth will host a luncheon of homemade soups, beginning around 11:30 in the Parish Hall, to raise funds for our Food Pantry. We'll have specially marked envelopes in the pews, and you may use them to place donations of any amount in the offering plate or in the big soup pot in Parish Hall.

# Thank you for the many ways that you contribute to this ministry that is very much appreciated by our neighbors!

We'll have an table in the Parish Hall during the event, to share info about the many ways people can participate in the special ministry, but in the meantime, if you would like to help with this effort by helping to give out food on Tuesday or Thursday afternoons, please contact any of us. (We do this in groups of 4 or 5, so experts are close at hand. And if a volunteer speaks a bit of Spanish, that's a bonus!)

# Some stats from 2023:

In the last half of 2023, we helped to feed people in 331 different households (a 30% increase over 2022), 914 people of all ages: 304 children, 480 adults, and 130 seniors. Many of them came only once or twice in that period, while a few, including some "working poor," came nearly every week. Overall, they averaged one visit every other month. We spent about \$25,500 in 2023 to purchase nutritious food, in addition to the items generously donated by our parishioners and some local churches or other organizations that don't run food pantry ministries of their own but want to help our neighbors. (Because of increased food costs, we made the difficult decision to stop buying toiletries and rely solely on donated items.) With money donated for our food pantry, we're able to stretch those dollars by comparing prices and ordering in bulk from some local stores, as well as from the Central PA Food Bank (from which we get selected items at drastically reduced prices).

# Definition of the Month: \*Cisgender or Cis:

internal sense of gender matches the sex they were identified with at birth. It is preferable to the outdated terms "non-transgender" or "biological" woman/man. The Latin root "-cis" means "on this side" as opposed to "trans-" which means across or beyond.

# Q. How can I be a better ally, someone who wants to support and welcome Trans folks?

# 1. Offer Your Own Pronouns

When introducing yourself such as at meetings or gatherings, state your own pronouns, even if you are a \*cisgender person. This helps to make stating one's pronouns part of everyday conversation and can make trans and non-binary people feel welcome, not different. Example: "I'm Sheila, I'm from St John's Episcopal, and I use she/her pronouns."

# 2. Add Your Own Pronouns to your E-mail or Zoom name

Again this applies even-and especially- if you are cis. If you use an email signature, add your pronouns in parentheses next to your name or title. Alternately, change the name that pops up in your email name to include your pronouns. Example: "John Waters, MD (he/him/his)" or "John (he/him)"

# 3. Add Your Own Pronouns on your Nametag

Cis or trans, at church, or any other gathering, write in your pronouns. Or, add a pin to your nametag or lanyard that expresses your pronouns such as one that simply says "They/Them."

The December financial report includes numerous accounting adjustments and transactions to close the fiscal year. Notably from this reconciliation process, \$12.6k was transferred from our operating account to our restricted investment account as reserved savings for future expenses. These monies were mostly J2A fundraiser income (\$8.5k) and net food pantry gifts (\$3.7k).

Net operating deficit for the year was \$10.2k, very favorable to the budgeted deficit of \$35.0k, but unfavorable to previous year's surplus of \$14.1k. Most favorable for 2023 were lower bookkeeping costs and higher non-pledged contributions and memorial gifts. Higher utilities and ground maintenance expenses were unfavorable.

209 Concord financials were basically breakeven for the year. The \$8.0k Shaped by Faith grant was offset by higher than budgeted maintenance and water/sewer expenses.

Net deposits to our investment accounts totaled \$21.9k for the year. Interest and dividends less fees, plus unrealized gains due to a rebounding equity market, added an additional \$200k (13%) to the ending total balance.
