

MARCH 29TH AT NOON - STATIONS OF THE CROSS

Being a newer person at the parish, I am always finding new and interesting things to look at while on the property. St. John's is truly a beautiful place. One of the things that has intrigued me are the stained glass Stations of the Cross inside the nave. They are all different by design and all have a story to tell. From what I understand, the "Stations" were designed and made by the Youth of the parish in the early 2000's. What an amazing gift and blessing to the church!



So, what are the Stations of the Cross? Known by a number of names like the Stations of the Cross, Way of the Cross, Way of Sorrows, or the Via Crucis (to name a few) are a series of 14 pictures, carvings, or other artwork, portraying the events in the Passion of Christ. They begin with Jesus' condemnation by Pontius Pilate, his journey carrying his own cross to Golgotha where he was crucified, and concludes with his entombment after his death.



JOIN US on Good Friday, March 29 beginning at Noon in the Atrium. We will use **Everyone's Way of the Cross** as our liturgy and the stained glass Stations as our visual guide as walk with Jesus on his last steps and conclude our own Lenten Journey. FOOD PANTRY

Thanks to you for your response to our appeal for more volunteers! We now have 48 volunteers in various capacities, including 11 who are new to this ministry!

In 2023, we had 2245 visits from members of our community, as compared to 1625 in 2022. This increase in demand has challenged our budget, and we made the difficult decision to stop buying toiletries. However, our visitors still need and often ask for toiletries. So...

During this season of Lent, we're conducting a Dignity Campaign to support our Food Pantry visitors, and it includes toiletries (toothpaste, shampoo & conditioner, deodorant, bars of soap, diapers & wipes, feminine hygiene products, toilet paper and facial tissues, dishwashing detergent, and laundry detergent pods or sheets) and hats, scarves, gloves, and socks.

Thank you for all you do to support this critical ministry to our neighbors!

Seeing the Value in Others:

God calls us to love one another. Seeing value in everyone is not the same as agreeing or being best friends with everyone. Instead, it means showing all people the love of Christ through what we do and how we treat them.

The Feeding Ministries of St. John's Episcopal Church want to challenge you to support basic human dignity through our outreach in the community. During Lent we ask you to help us fill our collection wagons in the Parish Hall, Atrium and downstairs elevator lobby with food AND also with toiletries and supplies that help people maintain their basic human dignity!

SNAP and other food support programs do not provide money for non-food items like toilet paper, shampoo, toothpaste, bar soap or diapers. During COVID, many of our visitors asked us for help obtaining these items, and because of that sharing, all your Feeding Ministries responded!

- Toiletries are now offered during the Tuesday/Thursday food pantry.
- The Fence of Love grew up next to the Blessings Box to provide hats, scarves, gloves and socks during the colder months.
- The Community Breakfast Program added a table to share gloves and socks with their guests in the winter.

Know your Queer* Saints!

The Reverend Dr. Pauli Murray (1910-1985)

Last month at our TLC (Trans Loving Community) meeting, we talked about the extraordinary life of Pauli Murray, a 20th Century African-American and Episcopal Saint who was part of the LGBTQIA+ community.

A note about pronouns: Pauli Murray was perceived to be a woman and used she/her pronouns for themselves, though frequently expressed that they felt male and



sought out gender-affirming medical care (which they were denied). Since Pauli did not have access to the terminology of today, and we can't know Pauli's wishes, the Pauli Murray Center uses "s/he" and "they" pronouns in writing of Pauli's life.

Born in Baltimore & raised by their aunt in North Carolina, Pauli moved to New York to prepare for college at the age of 16 and quickly became involved in the Civil Rights movement. As early as 1940 Pauli organized sit-ins, was arrested for sitting in the White section of a bus, and worked with activists for labor rights. In 1956 Pauli published "Proud Shoes", a memoir which used their own mixed family heritage to convey how white supremacy was an essential part of U.S. slavery.

Fighting discrimination throughout their academic career, Pauli became the first Black person to earn a JSD[Doctor of the Science of Law] degree from Yale Law School in 1965. They used their law career to advance civil & women's rights, supplying legal aid to both movements. Their arguments were later used in landmark Supreme Court decisions to outlaw racism and sexism.

Pauli was a pioneer in what today we call "intersectionality", or seeing that race, class, gender, and sexuality were issues that couldn't be completely separated. In the 1960s they worked closely with Martin Luther King, Jr, Bayard Rustin and other leaders. However, s/he was critical of the lesser roles women were allowed to play in the movement. Similarly, s/he helped found the National Organization for Women, but left because they felt that Black women's issues were being left out.

For 5 years, Pauli taught at Brandeis University but after their partner Irene Barlow died in 1973, Pauli (now in their mid-60s) entered the seminary. Pauli was ordained in 1977, becoming the first Black person perceived as a woman to become an Episcopal priest.

Pauli died from cancer in 1985 on July 1st, which is now their feast day. They were named an Episcopal Saint in 2012 by Bishop Michael Curry who said they "had an agenda for the human good that was constant and unswerving". Pauli is considered the first modern queer Episcopal saint.

Definition of the Month:

* Queer: Once considered a slur, the word "Queer" has been embraced by many in the LGBTQIA+ community (especially youth) as a "shorthand" word for that acronym; it includes those who identify as Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Questioning/Queer, Intersex, Asexual, as well as those who use other terms, fall between those terms, or have yet to choose a term. As with the + symbol, it acknowledges the ever-changing nature of language and terminology. Due to its offensive origins, some people may not feel comfortable using or identifying as this term.

Nametags Help Us Welcome the Stranger and the Friend!

As we noted in TLC tips last month, wearing your pronouns on a nametag or pin is a GREAT way to communicate that St. John's is a safe space for LGBTQIA+ people. Starting this week, we'll have a table of pronoun pins next to our nametag board in the atrium Please find one that matches your pronouns and add it to your nametag! And then...wear your nametag!to services, coffee hour, open meetings. We can ALL use a refresher on names & spellings, and this can help any newbies feel at home! [Not to mention our many neurodiverse members who may have a hard time remembering names]. If you need a new nametag, please see an usher and ask!

High operating income resulted in a surplus of approximately \$27k in January. This was largely due to advanced annual giving by several parishioners. The high Jubilee income reflects the deposit of \$7860 for the food pantry from ExtraGive donations last November. Operating expenses for the month were on budget across the board.

Payroll processing has been transferred to Paychex, a new provider, effective January 1, along with some internal payroll processing improvements. We have also transitioned the financial reporting of monthly asset balances to be more consistent with other reports. In the past, assets were reported from monthly bank statements, which do not include uncleared deposits and payments. Going forward, uncleared transactions will be included, and the asset balance sheet will be on the same basis as the income statement.
