

Charles Hutchinson Gabriel was born in Wilton, Muscatine County, Iowa on August 18, 1856 and raised on a farm. His father led singing schools in their home, and young Charles developed an interest in music. It is said that he taught himself to play the family's reed organ. Even though he never had any formal training in music, he began to travel and lead his own shape note-singing schools in various locations around the age of 17. His musical talent was well recognized in his boyhood home of Wilton.

THE FIRST LESSON: Numbers 21:4-9 (please be seated)

From Mount Hor the Israelites set out by the way to the Red Sea, to go around the land of Edom; but the people became impatient on the way. The people spoke against God and against Moses, "Why have you brought us up out of Egypt to die in the wilderness? For there is no food and no water, and we detest this miserable food." Then the Lord sent poisonous serpents among the people, and they bit the people, so that many Israelites died. The people came to Moses and said, "We have sinned by speaking against the Lord and against you; pray to the Lordto take away the serpents from us." So Moses prayed for the people. And the Lord said to Moses, "Make a poisonous serpent, and set it on a pole; and everyone who is bitten shall look at it and live." So Moses made a serpent of bronze, and put it upon a pole; and whenever a serpent bit someone, that person would look at the serpent of bronze and live.

THE EPISTLE: Ephesians 2:1-10

You were dead through the trespasses and sins in which you once lived, following the course of this world, following the ruler of the power of the air, the spirit that is now at work among those who are disobedient. All of us once lived among them in the passions of our flesh, following the desires of flesh and senses, and we were by nature children of wrath, like everyone else. But God, who is rich in mercy, out of the great love with which he loved us even when we were dead through our trespasses, made us alive together with Christ-- by grace you have been saved-- and raised us up with him and seated us with him in the heavenly places in Christ Jesus, so that in the ages to come he might show the immeasurable riches of his grace in kindness toward us in Christ Jesus. For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God-- not the result of works, so that no one may boast. For we are what he has made us, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand to be our way of life.

THE OFFERTORY Beneath the Cross Cindy Berry

The tune most associated with this text is ST. CHRISTOPHER by Frederick C. Maker (1844–1927), first published in the 1881 Supplement to The Bristol Tune Book. Maker's tune was written for this text. At the time, he was organist of Clifton Down Congregational Church in Bristol, England. It has some interesting similarities to Sankey's tune, including the same chromatic alteration of the fourth note, and a similar rhythmic layout, and yet Maker's tune is distinctly his own. It moves mostly by step with only a few notable leaps. In the second phrase, a leap to the upper tonic descends nearly an octave in contrary movement with a rising bass line, settling on the secondary dominant chord (III) from where it started (vi). Two phrases later, we find a leap upward to the leading tone (at "burning"), this time eventually settling down and resting on the lower tonic, a note previously only glimpsed in passing throughout the movement of the melody, therefore finding rest on its long journey.

THE SANCTUS

Holy, Holy, Holy Lord, God of power and might heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest. Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

(During Lent, it is customary to kneel during the Eucharistic Prayer)

Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all. He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O Father, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling his death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts.

Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom. All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ. By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. **AMEN.**

The Episcopal Church invites all who seek God to our Lord's table. If you wish to receive, please come forward to the altar rail when the usher indicates. Hold out your hands to receive the bread. For the wine, you can receive by guiding the chalice to your lips or by dipping your wafer into the separate intinction cup. If you do not wish to receive the wine, cross your arms over your chest when the wine passes. If you desire a blessing instead of communion, simply cross your arms over your chest. When finished, please exit to your right. Gluten free wafers are also available.

St. John's Traveler Letter:

Did you know St. John's has a team of pilgrims who travel every week to the very places we pray for in the Anglican communion? Follow John as he shares a little bit about the church and the places he visits:

Hi Pastor Amanda,

Surfs up in...southern California! Every so often it's nice to take a break from my travels to be somewhere familiar. This week's cycle of prayer brought me home to the Episcopal Church here in the States, and I've spent the last few days on a road trip headed west from the Atlantic to the Pacific, stopping at parishes along the way to talk about my travels.

I can tell people are learning a lot by listening to me, but what they don't realize is that I'm learning just as much from them, here in a place that will always be home but also sometimes feels a little foreign. Sure, remembering to driving on the right hand side of the road took some getting used to, but I've also picked up on little things in my week here in the States that you might not notice in your day-to-day routine. Since coming home, I'm reminded of these little things that make the US just a little different from the rest of the world, just a little special.

For instance, Americans can strike up a conversation with you about anything. I spoke with a man outside a grocery store in Kansas City for over an hour once he realized I had just been in Uganda, where he had gone on a mission trip nearly 30 years ago. Americans also can be so accommodating -- after my car broke down in rural Indiana, an auto body shop that was about to close spent two hours after hours fixing my car (a missing brake caliper, if you want to know). And in Denver, I was reminded that, no matter what people are currently going through, Americans have an optimism about them that is hard to match – "make sure you check out the wild bison preserve," they told me, or "you're going to love the drive through this mountain pass," they said.

It's nice to be reminded of these small blessings, because it seems like only the worst news seems to make headlines in newspapers or social media. It's an important reminder that there are good people here doing their best to make the world a little better.

Now if you'll excuse me, I'm going to catch the sunset over the Pacific Ocean, think a little bit, and then head back out into the world, reinvigorated by the people of this country and ready to meet the good people of the next.
