

THE LITURGY OF THE PALMS

(Our Liturgy will begin in the courtyard)

Celebrant Blessed is the King who comes in the name of the Lord:

People Peace in heaven and glory in the highest.

Celebrant Let us pray.

Assist us mercifully with your help, O Lord God of our salvation, that we may enter with joy upon the contemplation of those mighty acts, whereby you have given us life and immortality; through Jesus Christ our Lord. *Amen*.

Mark 11:1-11

When they were approaching Jerusalem, at Bethphage and Bethany, near the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two of his disciples and said to them, "Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately as you enter it, you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden; untie it and bring it. If anyone says to you, 'Why are you doing this?' just say this, 'The Lord needs it and will send it back here immediately." They went away and found a colt tied near a door, outside in the street. As they were untying it, some of the bystanders said to them, "What are you doing, untying the colt?" They told them what Jesus had said; and they allowed them to take it. Then they brought the colt to Jesus and threw their cloaks on it; and he sat on it. Many people spread their cloaks on the road, and others spread leafy branches that they had cut in the fields. Then those who went ahead and those who followed were shouting,

"Hosanna!

Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord!

Blessed is the coming kingdom of our ancestor David!

Hosanna in the highest heaven!"

Then he entered Jerusalem and went into the temple; and when he had looked around at everything, as it was already late, he went out to Bethany with the twelve.

On this day he entered the holy city of Jerusalem in triumph, and was proclaimed as King of kings by those who spread their garments and branches of palm along his way.

Let these branches be for us signs of his victory, and grant that we who bear them in his name may ever hail him as our King, and follow him in the way that leads to eternal life; who lives and reigns in glory with you and the Holy Spirit, now and for ever. *Amen*.

THE FIRST LESSON: ISAIAH 50:4-9A (please be seated for the readings)

The Lord God has given me the tongue of a teacher, that I may know how to sustain the weary with a word. Morning by morning he wakens--wakens my ear to listen as those who are taught. The Lord God has opened my ear, and I was not rebellious, I did not turn backward. I gave my back to those who struck me, and my cheeks to those who pulled out the beard; I did not hide my face from insult and spitting. The Lord God helps me; therefore I have not been disgraced; therefore I have set my face like flint, and I know that I shall not be put to shame; he who vindicates me is near. Who will contend with me? Let us stand up together. Who are my adversaries? Let them confront me. It is the Lord God who helps me; who will declare me guilty?

Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited, but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness. And being found in human form, he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death-- even death on a cross. Therefore God also highly exalted him and gave him the name that is above every name, so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:


Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

THE GARDEN OF REPOSE AND OVERNIGHT VIGIL

When Jesus was in the Garden of Gethsemane, his disciples couldn't stay awake for even an hour with him. Out of this moment of Scripture, the custom developed of keeping a "Holy Hour" of prayer in a garden-like setting with the consecrated elements, the Body and Blood of Christ, between our Maundy Thursday service and our Good Friday service.

These hours are a quiet time to reflect on Jesus' path, feel his lonely struggle to accept the will of God, the danger he faced, and the terrifying events that would unfold. They also offer an opportunity to share our own concerns, struggles and joys with God. The hour-long time slots provide an opportunity to watch and wait with Christ. There are two slots available for each hour throughout the night.

This year, you also have the opportunity to watch and wait from home. A livestream will be set up on our St. John's YouTube channel in Mary's Chapel for those who would like to hold vigil but are unable to make it into the church.

St. John's Traveler Letter:

Did you know St. John's has a team of pilgrims who travel every week to the very places we pray for in the Anglican communion? Follow John as he shares a little bit about the church and the places he visits:

Dear Pastor Amanda,

Hello from the small West African country of the Gambia! This Palm Sunday of the most holy week on the church calendar feels just a little more real when there are actual palm trees everywhere you look. I imagined Jesus returning to Jerusalem two thousand years ago, palms waving in the early spring heat, and felt a little closer to God in the moment.

If you check out the Gambia on a map, it looks like just a little squiggle that follows the River Gambie as it twists and turns before emptying into the Atlantic Ocean. In fact, the Gambia is the smallest country on the African continent – you could drive across the country in about six hours, or about the time it takes to drive across Pennsylvania.

Around 300 years ago, more than 5,000 Gambians per year were sold and shipped to America as slaves – some to even to Pennsylvania. They were treated horribly, and many were separated from their family with no way to return back to the Gambia. Walking around the Gambian capital of Banjul, it's hard to believe what it was like hundreds of years ago, knowing that you or a loved one could be kidnapped and sent thousands of miles away to work on a cotton plantation against your will.

The effects of slavery can still be felt—who knows how many families would still be living together today in the Gambia if they weren't ripped apart 300 years ago? I was talking to James Allen Yaw Odico, the bishop here, about how people try to keep moving forward despite the scars of the past. He pointed to St. Mary's Cathedral in front of me, a simple but beautiful church with a soaring belltower surrounded by palms. "Faith," he said. "Whether it's found in a Christian church, or a Muslim mosque, or even in a quiet small space outside wherever you are."

I'm wishing you all the same faith to guide you through the ups and downs in your life as we head into Holy Week ahead of Jesus' resurrection on Easter. Christ is coming – wave your palms high!
