

With acolytes and processions, communal singing, and a mission to love and serve our neighbors, this service invites one to participate in the coming of the Kingdom. At St. John's everyone is welcome to the Lord's table.

And by this we will know that we are from the truth and will reassure our hearts before him whenever our hearts condemn us; for God is greater than our hearts, and he knows everything. Beloved, if our hearts do not condemn us, we have boldness before God; and we receive from him whatever we ask, because we obey his commandments and do what pleases him.

And this is his commandment, that we should believe in the name of his Son Jesus Christ and love one another, just as he has commanded us. All who obey his commandments abide in him, and he abides in them. And by this we know that he abides in us, by the Spirit that he has given us.

Celebrant The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus said, "I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. The hired hand, who is not the shepherd and does not own the sheep, sees the wolf coming and leaves the sheep and runs away—and the wolf snatches them and scatters them. The hired hand runs away because a hired hand does not care for the sheep. I am the good shepherd. I know my own and my own know me, just as the Father knows me and I know the Father. And I lay down my life for the sheep. I have other sheep that do not belong to this fold. I must bring them also, and they will listen to my voice. So there will be one flock, one shepherd. For this reason the Father loves me, because I lay down my life in order to take it up again. No one takes it from me, but I lay it down of my own accord. I have power to lay it down, and I have power to take it up again. I have received this command from my Father."

Recalling Christ's death and his descent among the dead, proclaiming his resurrection and ascension to your right hand, awaiting his coming in glory; and offering to you, from the gifts you have given us, this bread and this cup, we praise you and we bless you.





St. John's Traveler Letter:

Did you know St. John's has a team of pilgrims who travel every week to the very places we pray for in the Anglican communion? Follow John as he shares a little bit about the church and the places he visits:

Dear Pastor Amanda,

G'day, mate! After a delightful visit to New Zealand, I have found my way to the rugged beauty of Australia. Australia is the sixth-largest country in the world, and it is also a continent. The country's landscape includes seaside towns and bustling coastal cities, where most of the population lives, mountain ranges that get more snow than the Swiss Alps, and the famous, remote Australian outback, which has a mix of stunning natural beauty and desolate areas that seemingly stretch beyond the horizon. It has been a delight to see animals such as kangaroos and koala bars, which exist only in Australia!

I have spent most of my time exploring Sydney, the capital of the Australian state of New South Wales and home of the famous Sydney Opera House. Sydney is also Australia's largest, oldest, and most-populated city. Just like in New Zealand, it is autumn here because Australia is in the Southern Hemisphere, and the weather is cool and brisk. Sydney is on Australia's East Coast, and the city embraces the arts, nature, and wildlife. Today, I explored the Bondi to Coogee Coastal Walk, where I enjoyed stunning views of the ocean, beaches, and sandstone cliffs.

Yesterday, my new Australian friends invited me to a "barbie." I wasn't quite sure what to expect, but I quickly learned that "barbie" is what the Aussies call a barbecue! Australians are warm and friendly, and I was delighted to talk with people from so many different cultures and nationalities at the neighborhood barbie. Australia is home to people from around the world, and I was fascinated to learn from my friends that nearly 30% of the people who live in Australia are from other countries and that nearly 50% of Australians have a parent who was born overseas.

I hope you'll keep this magical place and all of its people in your prayers. You may have heard news reports of two major outbreaks of violence in Sydney this month alone, and these events have rocked the normally peaceful city. I pray that all those who are impacted by violence around the world find healing, safety, and peace.

Blessings to you and our St. John's family this Easter season. My travels throughout the world continue to remind me that we are all one family, connected through and by the love of God.


