

THE FIRST LESSON: ACTS 3:12-19 (please be seated for the readings)

Peter addressed the people, "You Israelites, why do you wonder at this, or why do you stare at us, as though by our own power or piety we had made him walk? The God of

Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob, the God of our ancestors has glorified his servant Jesus, whom you handed over and rejected in the presence of Pilate, though he had decided to release him. THE HOLY GOSPEL: LUKE 24:36B-48 (please remain standing as you are able)

Celebrant The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus himself stood among the disciples and said to them, "Peace be with you." They were startled and terrified, and thought that they were seeing a ghost. He said to them, "Why are you frightened, and why do doubts arise in your hearts? Look at my hands and my feet; see that it is I myself. Touch me and see; for a ghost does not have flesh and bones as you see that I have." And when he had said this, he showed them his hands and his feet. While in their joy they were disbelieving and still wondering, he said to them, "Have you anything here to eat?" They gave him a piece of broiled fish, and he took it and ate in their presence. Then he said to them, "These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you—that everything written about me in the law of Moses, the prophets, and the psalms must be fulfilled." To fulfill your purpose he gave himself up to death; and, rising from the grave, destroyed death, and made the whole creation new.




And grant that we may find our inheritance with all the saints who have found favor with you in ages past. We praise you in union with them and give you glory through your Son Jesus Christ our Lord.

William Croft was an English composer and organist. Perhaps Croft's most notable legacy is the suite of Funeral Sentences which have been described as a "glorious work of near genius". The seven Sentences themselves are from the Book of Common Prayer and are verses from various books of the Bible, intended to be said or sung during an Anglican funeral. One of the sentences, Thou knowest, Lord, the secrets of our hearts, was not composed by Croft, but by Henry Purcell, part of his 1695 Music for the Funeral of Queen Mary.

St. John's Traveler Letter:

Did you know St. John's has a team of pilgrims who travel every week to the very places we pray for in the Anglican communion? Follow John as he shares a little bit about the church and the places he visits:

Dear Pastor Amanda.

I hope that you and our St. John's family are having a wonderful Easter season! It is such a joy to share what I am learning with you in my travels. Our world is a beautiful place, and I see God's glory everywhere I look, in people, in nature, and in communities. I am spending this glorious Second Sunday of Easter in the city of Christchurch on New Zealand's South Island. New Zealand is also known by its traditional name, Aotearoa, which reflects the history and heritage of its indigenous Māori people. I have traveled a long way since I wrote to you from Egypt, more than 10,000 miles and an eleven-hour time difference! Would you believe it's not spring here, but autumn because New Zealand is in the southern hemisphere? The weather is brisk and rejuvenating in the mid-50s, and the sun is shining brightly.

I have learned so much about this vibrant city that embraces arts, culture, culinary delights, and nature. In my short time here, I have taken in as much as I can! My new friends from Christchurch took me on a gondola ride where I marveled at the stunning panoramic views of this coastal city, and we have hiked along glacier lakes and through mountain trails in the Southern Alps that radiate divine glory and beauty.

It's hard to believe that just over 10 years ago, tragedy struck this city. A series of earthquakes began in September 2010 and culminated with a massive aftershock in February 2014 that killed 185 people in Christchurch and destroyed many buildings in its historic city center. Even the spire of the 150-year-old Anglican Cathedral collapsed. Massive rebuilding efforts are underway for the Cathedral, but a funding crisis is soon coming to head, which may jeopardize the project.

I have also learned so much about the culture of the Māori, the indigenous Polynesian people of New Zealand who represent approximately 17% of the country's population. Māori folklore and mythology are a key part of New Zealand's heritage and preserved through storytelling. Māori rights for the most part have long been protected, and many seats in Parliament are reserved for them. Recent policy shifts, however, appear to be threatening their gains. I hope you'll keep this beautiful place and all of its people in your prayers. Blessings to you and our St. John's family this Easter season. My travels throughout the world continue to remind me that we are all one family, connected through and by the love of God.
