

Enriching our Worship, or EOW, is part of an ongoing process of listening to what the Spirit is saying to the Church through the diverse experience of those who gather to worship. Our musical selections come from one of two resources: The 1982 Hymnal (*the red book, the S stands for Service Music and is found in the front of the hymnal*) and Wonder, Love, and Praise (*WLP, which is the green book*). We pray you experience the love of God through our worship and fellowship.

THE FIRST LESSON: Isaiah 6:1-8 (please be seated)

In the year that King Uzziah died, I saw the Lord sitting on a throne, high and lofty; and the hem of his robe filled the temple. Seraphs were in attendance above him; each had six wings: with two they covered their faces, and with two they covered their feet, and with two they flew. And one called to another and said: "Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of hosts; the whole earth is full of his glory."

The pivots on the thresholds shook at the voices of those who called, and the house filled with smoke. And I said: "Woe is me! I am lost, for I am a man of unclean lips, and I live among a people of unclean lips; yet my eyes have seen the King, the Lord of hosts!"

THE HOLY GOSPEL: John 3:1-17 (please rise in body or spirit)

CelebrantThe Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.PeopleGlory to you, Lord Christ.

There was a Pharisee named Nicodemus, a leader of the Jews. He came to Jesus by night and said to him, "Rabbi, we know that you are a teacher who has come from God; for no one can do these signs that you do apart from the presence of God." Jesus answered him, "Very truly, I tell you, no one can see the kingdom of God without being born from above." Nicodemus said to him, "How can anyone be born after having grown old? Can one enter a second time into the mother's womb and be born?" Jesus answered, "Very truly, I tell you, no one can enter the kingdom of God without being born of water and Spirit. What is born of the flesh is flesh, and what is born of the Spirit is spirit. Do not be astonished that I said to you, 'You must be born from above.' The wind blows where it chooses, and you hear the sound of it, but you do not know where it comes from or where it goes. So it is with everyone who is born of the Spirit." Nicodemus said to him, "How can these things be?" Jesus answered him, "Are you a teacher of Israel, and yet you do not understand these things?

"Very truly, I tell you, we speak of what we know and testify to what we have seen; yet you do not receive our testimony. If I have told you about earthly things and you do not believe, how can you believe if I tell you about heavenly things? No one has ascended into heaven except the one who descended from heaven, the Son of Man. And just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, that whoever believes in him may have eternal life.

"For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life. Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him."

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

Blessed are you, gracious God, creator of the universe and giver of life. You formed us in your own image and called us to dwell in your infinite love. You gave the world into our care that we might be your faithful stewards and show forth your bountiful grace.

But we failed to honor your image in one another and in ourselves; we would not see your goodness in the world around us; and so we violated your creation, abused one another, and rejected your love. Yet you never ceased to care for us, and prepared the way of salvation for all people.

Through Abraham and Sarah you called us into covenant with you. You delivered us from slavery, sustained us in the wilderness, and raised up prophets to renew your promise of salvation. Then, in the fullness of time, you sent your eternal Word, made mortal flesh in Jesus. Born into the human family, and dwelling among us, he revealed your glory. Giving himself freely to death on the cross, he triumphed over evil, opening the way of freedom and life.

On the night before he died for us, Our Savior Jesus Christ took bread, and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his friends, and said: "Take, eat: This is my Body which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

As supper was ending, Jesus took the cup of wine, and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said: "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is poured out for you and for all for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again. Remembering his death and resurrection, we now present to you from your creation this bread and this wine. By your Holy Spirit may they be for us the Body and Blood of our Savior Jesus Christ. Grant that we who share these gifts may be filled with the Holy Spirit and live as Christ's Body in the world. Bring us into the everlasting heritage of your children, that with St. John and all your saints, past, present, and yet to come, we may praise your Name for ever.

If you do not wish to receive the wine, cross your arms over your chest when the wine passes. If you desire a blessing instead of communion, simply cross your arms over your chest. Gluten free wafers are also available. If you are unable to come to the altar rail, please let an usher know and we would be happy to bring communion to you!

St. John's Traveler Letter:

Did you know St. John's has a team of pilgrims who travel every week to the very places we pray for in the Anglican communion? Follow John as he shares a little bit about the church and the places he visits:

Dear Pastor Amanda,

After being in Canada last week I feel as though I'm on the other side of the world now, and indeed I may be. I'm writing to you from the shores of Lake Malawi in the Republic of Malawi. A rather long and narrow country, this is part of the Anglican Province of Central Africa that includes Botswana, Zambia, and Zimbabwe. They tell me this freshwater lake is the fourth largest in the world, and it includes an amazing variety of fish. There are also hippopotamuses here! I may have to come back to get one for Christmas. :-)

The church in Malawi has a fascinating history, which I can only briefly summarize in a short letter. The first Anglican missionary was Bishop Charles MacKenzie, who came here in 1861 at the request of the famous Dr. David Livingstone. These two Scots followed their calling to eliminate the African slave trade (Livingstone) and welcome all people of all colors to worship together (MacKenzie). I encourage you to read more about the work they did here. Today nearly three fourths of the population are Christian, and there seems to be little of the violent ethnic or religious divides that plague other African countries. While relatively peaceful, Malawi is also one of the poorest countries in the world. It's estimated that the average income for many Malawians is just over \$2.00 / day. There are some governmental programs and several multinational NGOs that are working to reduce this extreme poverty, primarily by assisting with educational opportunities for girls. Economists have learned that one of the best ways to eliminate poverty is to help more girls and women to learn to read and write. The women will then lead their families and villages in more sustainable vocations.

This evening, I am visiting with my new-found friends, and I am learning about their game of Bawo. Have you played Mancala? Bawo is sort of similar. It's played with a wooden board of four rows of eight cups in which you move, and take your opponent's, marbles. Although so far mostly they're taking my marbles - all in good fun. We're leaving the wet and rainy season here, so there is much in bloom as we go into Summer. Very similar to Lancaster, I presume. Enjoy the season.
