AUGUST ADULT FORUM

During the month of August, St. John's forums after the 9:00 AM Eucharist we will be learning about what the Episcopal Church and other faith communities are doing about helping to End Gun Violence in our country.

August 11th: Sue Heilman is Lancaster County's coordinator of the Lancaster Memorial to the Lost and will be inviting us to put up the t-shirts on our campus's grassy areas. Each t-shirt has the name of a person killed by gun violence in Lancaster County. The memorial will stay up through the end of August and hopefully spur discussions, prayers and awareness to those driving and walking by. There will be educational materials explaining what the Memorial is for passers-by to take and read.

August 18th: Bryan Miller from Philadelphia, executive director of Heeding God's Call to End Gun Violence, a state-wide faith-based, grass roots movement, will share how we can more effectively do public witness and policy advocacy in this area. One of the ways Heeding does this is by erecting t-shirt Memorials to those Lost by gun homicide in each county. (The gun suicide rate would more than double these numbers.)

August 25th: Deacon Anne Flynn will speak about our Diocesion efforts. They are currently planning on showing The Tree of Life Massacre documentary on October 25 & 26 throughout the diocese. She will bring us up to date on the monthly diocesan Zoom meetings called, Saving Lives: Ending Gun Violence. All are welcome to listen in to this zoom anytime. She will also be speaking about other statewide and national groups working on this issue.

FOOD PANTRY NEWS FROM DEBBIE CARTER

A Behind-the-Scenes Look at Food Pantry Buying

Your Food Pantry leaders and purchasing teams are offering an inside look at what goes into the bags of food that we give to our visitors. Most of our food items are ordered in bulk from Lidl or the Central PA Food Bank (CPFB), but we also take advantage of great regular prices and/or sales at local stores.

Here are the items that we include in each bag we give to our visitors:

We purchase sturdy cloth or plastic bags that can be reused – they cost less than cardboard boxes – and we include a note, inviting the recipient to reuse the bag or bring it back for us to reuse. (For years, we used the cardboard boxes in which Rob Ashton's dialysis fluids had been shipped. R.I.P. Rob 2021.)

Note: Because space in the bags is very limited, we can't accommodate larger sizes of these items. If we receive donations of larger items, we offer them on our "extras" cart (from which people may choose 3 items).

MUSINGS FROM THE ORGAN BENCH....When In Our Music God Is Glorified...*



As I begin my fourth month here at St. John's as the Minister of Music, I find myself continually blessed by a congregational family that enjoys being together in worship and in service to the greater community. The title of this article is that of the opening words of a hymn by Fred Pratt Green and one will find that hymn in the 1982 hymnal as #420 *. The music of hymns, coupled with wonderful poetry of ancient and modern times continues to be one of the treasures of the Christian faith. Fred wrote another hymn that I think describes in many ways the people of St. John's. See if you agree (and please respond.... I never know, through the years, if anyone actually reads my articles...!) The title of the hymn is simply "Partners":

What Joy it is to worship here
And find ourselves at home,
Where God, who uses every gift,
Has room for all who come!
Yet are no two of us alike
Of all the human race,
And we must seek a common ground
If we would share his grace.

Hymns of the church.... the sounds, the words, the combinations of the two (e.g. "Amazing Grace") touch us whether we hear them, sing them or play them...are unlike any other expressions that are practiced in any religion in the world. I think of folks that have continued to be able to sing songs of long ago, even after their minds have been touched by dementia. I think of those among us for whom a sacred song has a way to lift them up physically, emotionally and spiritually over the years of life.

MUSIC CONTINUED

Music is a blessing and St. John's is blessed to be a singing congregation. It is also blessed to have a fine Chancel Choir. And I look forward to getting the Handbell Choir back into regular participation in worship in a variety of ways. We have a full filing cabinet of good handbell music that is silent print on paper until a group brings the sounds of what is composed to life by playing. I saw pictures of when St. John's had large boys and girls choirs. Wouldn't it be wonderful to once again have a children's choir here and I will be seeing if we can bring that together.

As to the fall schedule for our musical groups... Chancel Choir and Handbell Choir... I am looking to begin rehearsals for Chancel Choir on Wednesday evenings, beginning on August 28 at 7 p.m. And then, the following week on Thursday, September 5 at 7 p.m. I am looking forward to starting Handbell Choir rehearsals.

As I conclude this article, I would like to quote from Alex Hodgkinson, who recently retired from Trinity on the Green, New Haven, Connecticut. He was interviewed for an article that appeared in the June 2024 issue of the American Organist (AGO magazine). His "philosophy of music" is one that resonates with my personal philosophy of church music. He sums up his career of church music with these words: "What we sing from the choir stalls is the same as what we hear from the lectern and the pulpit. It can be condensed to one word: love. That's it. Love. If our mission and our behavior don't come back to that word, we are falling short. The reason for the existence of the choir (and I add...bells, instruments, organ, hymns, etc.) is to broadcast Christ's love." (The American Organist, June 2024, page 32).

Blessings as we move to the fall season and our return to the sanctuary space for worship and wonder!

FINANCIALS BY CHARLES WEAR, TREASURER



There was a \$12.5k operating deficit for June. However, after adjusting for a few exceptional items noted below, operating income and expenses for the month were largely on budget. Copier and phone/internet expenses were heavy for the month due to timing and terms of a new maintenance contract. We expect annual expenses to be close to or below budget. Payments for Becker House mold remediation work have been completed (\$19.1k). Insurance covered all but the \$5k deductible, which will be reimbursed from the R3 restricted building maintenance account in July. Thanks to the net proceeds from the Gratitude Dinner (\$1.8k) and a generous stock gift (\$2.8k) in June, all current expenses for the J2A trip to Ireland (\$29.1k) have been paid in full. The Martha Everett bequest (\$64.7k) was allocated per Vestry directive: 50% to the endowment fund, 40% to the capital project fund and 10% to the clergy discretionary fund. An additional \$6.8k from the trust remains in the endowment account due to an additional disbursement from the trust.

Capital gifts totaling \$45.8k were received in June. Expenses of \$132.1k included our monthly \$77k draw for HVAC contract work (with additional \$6k of unbudgeted work to replace the Becker House unit), and \$50.1k to order church lighting equipment.


