



THE POWER OF WARMTH AND LIGHT

If you've been on campus this summer, you surely would have noticed our campus is under construction! We wanted to share a progress report on all of the various projects happening!

<u>HVAC</u> - J&G is hoping to have our new HVAC system in the church charged and operational by the end of September. Only a few more weeks to go until we'll be moving back into our beautiful sanctuary.

<u>Lighting</u> – Eslinger Lighting will begin the installation of our new LED lighting system in the sanctuary on September 9th. This should take a little less than two weeks to complete.

<u>Electrical</u> - Lapp Electric will be on site with Eslinger to do the necessary electrical wiring/grounding running from our new panel which was completed this summer. We are up to code and will have safe electrical!

<u>Flooring</u> - Previously, we were planning to refinish the wood floors in the sanctuary ourselves. Unfortunately, the flooring used is an engineered floor with only an eighth inch of wood veneer on top of a plywood base. This makes sanding the floors for refinishing impossible. Estimates for replacing the floor with something similar but more durable are coming.



To date, we have received pledges and gifts totaling \$968,923 towards our goal of \$1,200,000. Thank you to everyone who has supported our campaign!

<u>Stained Glass</u> - We recently discovered the company we planned to use for our window restoration in the auditorium has gone out of business. New estimates were received from other local companies and were much higher than the previously enlisted company. We are looking at a +\$43,000.00 margin to the next closest estimate. Fortunately, this still puts us within the budgeted amount for window repairs the Vestry already approved. This work will most likely begin in October or November.

Please pray for all of the contractors and workers as they continue their work in making our campus a safer, warmer, and brighter place for all who gather here! Please also consider helping us reach our goal! If you haven't pledged to "The Power of Warmth and Light" it's not too late. Thank you for your steadfast support!

MUSINGS FROM THE ORGAN BENCH

I am a subscriber to the periodical called "Music and the Brain", thanks to one of my Reading Liederkranz Singers members, whose husband, who was active in the chorus until shortly before his death, was affected deeply by Parkinson's Disease. When I shared with her that my brother, at age 55 was diagnosed with the same terrible disease, she alerted me to this excellent source of information on all manner of diseases and disabilities related to the physical body and the brain. I can pass along information, by the way, for free subscriptions of magazine that focusses on all forms of brain disease, and injury.

In this particular, current issue, there is an extensive article by the wonderful opera star, Renée Fleming. Her focus is on the power of music to heal and to nurture the minds, whether we are "healthy" or "ill". I think of how, in the Old Testament, David was called upon to play his harp for King Saul, when he had an obvious psychological time of suffering. I think of the many, who were touched by music as I led them in playing choir chimes at the Personal Care unit of the Highlands Retirement Community in Wyomissing. I also think, more recently of my visit with Jeannie Zeller, before she became unresponsive. Her choices in music were extremely important to her as, what I consider, a gift to all who attended her service, recently. It was a delight to meet with a member who was anxious to meet me before she passed, so she would know who would be presenting her musical wishes. It was a treat, and I am glad to have had this brief encounter with this special person.

I think of how Beethoven, even when he was profoundly deaf, was able to compose the incredible Ninth Symphony, arguably his greatest work. I think of people who, through the years, have had their spirits revived just by hearing a familiar hymn, like Amazing Grace, or one of the great Welsh hymns such as God of Grace and God of Glory. We all have favorite hymns and pieces of music that nurture our souls. One of the most wonderful songs that John Lennon composed (in my opinion) was his piece entitled "Imagine". It was played at the request of Rosalyn Carter at her public Memorial Service. The words and the music fit like a glove. It is worthy of being quoted here:

Imagine there's no heaven It's easy if you try No hell below us Above us only sky Imagine all the people living for today Imagine there's no countries It isn't hard to do Nothing to kill or die for And no religion too Imagine all the people living life in peace, you. (John Lennon, 1971).

For Mrs. Carter, this song had a deeply spiritual meaning for her as she and Jimmy tried to live out their faith through the mission of the Carter Center and Habitat for Humanity for ALL people.

MUSINGS FROM THE ORGAN BENCH CONTINUED

What songs, hymns, chants, touch you this day? Relish them all as a gift that God has given us. Through the choir year, I hope to share with you all, through the choir, hymns and the organ, new and old pieces of music that touch my soul. In that light, I conclude this article with the lyrics to the first verse and chorus of what is perhaps, my favorite hymn. By the way, like Amazing Grace, it works perfectly on the bagpipe and I frequently include it when asked to play the bagpipes.

At some point this year, you will hear an anthem by the choir, an arrangement of which, was on my desk when I came. It is a 19th century hymn that now appears in almost every hymnal. The first verse is this:

My life flows on, in endless song, Above earth's lamentation. I hear the real though far-off hymn That hails a new creation. No storm can shake my inmost calm While to that Rock I'm clinging. Since Love is Lord of heaven and earth, How can I keep from singing. (Robert Lowry)

For us as a congregation, please know that for me, worship music isn't about performance, but it is about having "soul" in what we sing, what we hear, what we experience. And, to all who sang and played so "soulfully" this summer, I say 'thank you'. Your music ministered to me personally.


To my St. John's Family

Available 24-7, the box is located on the corner of the Becker House in a safe, well-lit area.

REFUGEE FAMILY UPDATE BY RICH GARON

Our neighbors, the Abdi family – Bati, Halima, Abidisa (18), Sutan (16), and Abdalla (9) – have lived at 209 N Concord just short of two years. St. John's program to assist refugee families settling in Lancaster envisioned 209 as transitional housing for a family for up to two years. Earlier this year, we were assisting the family in searching for housing within their budget. While Bati had been working since September 2022, in July, he received notice that he was among 200 people at his company that had been laid off. While his older son has found temporary part-time work, Bati is still looking. We've gotten him signed up for unemployment benefits, notwithstanding the Kafkaesque on-line application process, and he is actively seeking a job.

We've stressed things that he and Halima must do to find appropriate employment so they can transition to other housing. Moreover, we've spent considerable time assisting them. However, until work is found, plans now are for the family to remain at 209.

FINANCIALS BY CHARLES WEAR, TREASURER

A \$25k transfer from our investment account was made in July to support operations. This is the first budgeted draw of the year, which typically occurs in late summer to compensate for a drop off in contributions. This supplemental income resulted in a net surplus of \$3.8k for the month and provided a sufficient cash cushion to meet near-term obligations. YTD operating financials are running close to budget with a net surplus of \$4.9k, though this surplus is lower than last year (\$16.7k). A financial review of 2023 has been undertaken by independent auditor Ross, Buehler, Falk and Co. We undergo a formal review every three years. While costly, the review also qualifies the church for the ExtraGive in November.

Capital gifts of \$7.8k were received in July. Receipts for the entire project to date, including gifts, loans and savings total \$722.3k. July capital expenses of \$77.7k bring the project cost to date to \$605.0k. Projected near term expenses will probably require us to tap our line of credit with Orrstown Bank for the first time in late August.
