

With acolytes and processions, communal singing, and a mission to love and serve our neighbors, this service invites one to participate in the coming of the Kingdom.

A word about the "Mass of Creation" which we will use during October and November: Each year, the ecumenical church celebrates the "Season of Creation", culminating with the Feast of St. Francis, on October 4th. For us, the Blessing of the Animals takes place on that same day. Through the month of October, in our Sunday School classes, Adult Forums, and with the choir in worship, we remember that we are now in a "season of prayer and action" for the "protectors of our common home". Our worship will be guided by the work of Marty Haugen's "Mass of Creation", which remembers St. Francis and his ministry and through musical settings of St. Francis' prayer/poem, "All Creatures of our God and King."



THE SECOND LESSON: Hebrews 7:23-28

The former priests were many in number, because they were prevented by death from continuing in office; but Jesus holds his priesthood permanently, because he continues forever. Consequently he is able for all time to save those who approach God through him, since he always lives to make intercession for them. For it was fitting that we should have such a high priest, holy, blameless, undefiled, separated from sinners, and exalted above the heavens. Unlike the other high priests, he has no need to offer sacrifices day after day, first for his own sins, and then for those of the people; this he did once for all when he offered himself. For the law appoints as high priests those who are subject to weakness, but the word of the oath, which came later than the law, appoints a Son who has been made perfect forever.

SERMON THE REV. JEN TRENARY



THE SANCTUS



Glory and honor and praise to you, holy and living God. Living among us, Jesus loved us. He broke bread with outcasts and sinners, healed the sick, and proclaimed good news to the poor. Pour out your Spirit upon these gifts that they may be the Body and blood of Christ. Breathe your Spirit over the whole earth and make us your new creation, the Body of Christ given for the world you have made.

In the fullness of time bring us, with all your saints, from every tribe and language and people and nation, to feast at the banquet prepared from the foundation of the world. 

St. John's Traveler Letter:

Did you know St. John's has a team of pilgrims who travel to the very we pray for in the Anglican communion? Follow John as he shares about the church and the places he visits:

Dear Pastor Amanda,

This week I travel north to Scotland, which is the northern third of Great Britain including 790 surrounding islands. I arrived thinking that language may be less of a barrier in connecting with the people of Scotland considering English is the main language, but I admit the Gaelic dialect makes it tricky to follow along. Nevertheless, the visit has been delightful and filled with a multitude of lakes (lochs) as well as the beauty of the mountains in the Highlands. Although I arrived in Glasgow, the capital of Scotland, I wished to make it is a point to travel to the geographic center of Scotland, the village of Newtonmore in the district of Badenoch. A quaint number of nearly 1,100 inhabitants, the Newtonmore village is renowned for having a local *shinty* team - a team sport similar to field hockey and from the roots of Irish hurling but where you can only hit the ball when it is in the air. I feel as if the Knouse family would have great fun (and perhaps a few injuries) participating in shinty. Newtonmore also has 132 wildcats throughout the village. It is not as dangerous as it sounds, this Wildcat Experience is a community art project and these cats were designed and painted by the residents and can be found on rooftops, in trees and gardens, even in the lake.

If you are on social media, you know Highland cattle (specifically miniature Highlands) had had their moment this past summer, with their shaggy faces and horned heads. They <u>are</u> cuties and are associated with Scotland but they are <u>not</u> the national animal of Scotland...can you guess what is? *Unicorn!*

As exciting and humbling as my travels may be, often the trek can be lonely. My connection in Scotland throughout its seven dioceses and the college of bishops led us to share about the comfort of prayer. The following, shared by the Scottish leadership, especially as a traveler, come at just the right time and I thought you might find it worthy as well:

"For many Prayer is a daily, moment by moment, experience of talking to, listening to, and being with God. **Talking** to God, because our natural impulse is to share, to express the joys and sorrows we all know; **listening**, by opening our hearts to God's voice and guidance in scripture, silence and through other people. Simply being with God, in a relationship where words aren't always needed and sitting in God's presence is enough.

This experience of God in prayer not only renews our lives and the life of the Church. It also makes us fellow travelers with people of faith of many different traditions and gives us a language of spirituality we can share when "faith" can so often seem to divide."
