Here's something that might surprise you. Stewardship Season is one of my favorite times of the year. The season when we turn our attention to generosity, to taking care of God's gifts and God's people. The word "steward" comes from two ancient roots: *stig*, meaning "path, hall or part of a house," and *weard*, meaning "guardian, or a person who watches over." A steward is someone who protects a path, who watches over a house, who takes care of a treasure.

The inspiring good news is that we were born to be "stewards" in this ancient sense in the community that we all share, love, and serve. We are invited not only to protect and care for our individual home and church but also to protect and care for the wider church community, including all of God's amazing creatures, great and small.

This is the mission each of us was born into and the mission of St. John's as well. As members of St. John's, we are called to embody and proclaim our values to Grow in God, Act in Service, and Witness in Love.
