

With acolytes and processions, communal singing, and a mission to love and serve our neighbors, this service invites one to participate in the coming of the Kingdom.

A word about the "Mass of Creation" which we will use during October and November: Each year, the ecumenical church celebrates the "Season of Creation", culminating with the Feast of St. Francis, on October 4th. For us, the Blessing of the Animals takes place on that same day. Through the month of October, in our Sunday School classes, Adult Forums, and with the choir in worship, we remember that we are now in a "season of prayer and action" for the "protectors of our common home". Our worship will be guided by the work of Marty Haugen's "Mass of Creation", which remembers St. Francis and his ministry and through musical settings of St. Francis' prayer/poem, "All Creatures of our God and King."



THE FIRST LESSON: 1 Kings 17:8-16 (please be seated for the readings)

The word of the Lord came to Elijah, saying, "Go now to Zarephath, which belongs to Sidon, and live there; for I have commanded a widow there to feed you." So he set out and went to Zarephath. When he came to the gate of the town, a widow was there gathering sticks; he called to her and said, "Bring me a little water in a vessel, so that I may drink." As she was going to bring it, he called to her and said, "Bring me a morsel of bread in your hand." But she said, "As the Lord your God lives, I have nothing baked, only a handful of meal in a jar, and a little oil in a jug; I am now gathering a couple of sticks, so that I may go home and prepare it for myself and my son, that we may eat it, and die." Elijah said to her, "Do not be afraid; go and do as you have said; but first make me a little cake of it and bring it to me, and afterwards make something for yourself and

your son. For thus says the Lord the God of Israel: The jar of meal will not be emptied and the jug of oil will not fail until the day that the Lord sends rain on the earth." She went and did as Elijah said, so that she as well as he and her household ate for many days. The jar of meal was not emptied, neither did the jug of oil fail, according to the word of the Lord that he spoke by Elijah.

THE SECOND LESSON: Hebrews 9:24-28

Christ did not enter a sanctuary made by human hands, a mere copy of the true one, but he entered into heaven itself, now to appear in the presence of God on our behalf. Nor was it to offer himself again and again, as the high priest enters the Holy Place year after year with blood that is not his own; for then he would have had to suffer again and again since the foundation of the world. But as it is, he has appeared once for all at the end of

the age to remove sin by the sacrifice of himself. And just as it is appointed for mortals to die once, and after that the judgment, so Christ, having been offered once to bear the sins of many, will appear a second time, not to deal with sin, but to save those who are eagerly waiting for him.



Living among us, Jesus loved us. He broke bread with outcasts and sinners, healed the sick, and proclaimed good news to the poor. He yearned to draw all the world to himself yet we were heedless of his call to walk in love.



St. John's Traveler Letter:

Did you know St. John's has a team of pilgrims who travel to the very we pray for in the Anglican communion? Follow John as he shares about the church and the places he visits:

Dear Pastor Amanda,

Good morning and āyubōvan from Sri Lanka! This beautiful island country in the Indian Ocean has been so good to me over the past week. If you look at a map of Asia, it looks like a teardrop off the southern tip of India, but no crying here! There are few places where you can go from stunning mountains to stunning food, all the while eating stunning food!

The easiest way to get around is by train or tuk-tuk, which is sort of like a three-wheeled golf cart driven by a local. We spent our first day here on a ride through the rainforest only to stumble across an elephant and her baby at a small lake. I had no idea there were elephants here! It turns out that about a quarter of all the wildlife are endemic species to Sri Lanka, which is a fancy way of saying that you can't find these animals anywhere else in the world.

While Christianity is pretty new to most of Asia, it's been around in Sri Lanka for nearly 2,000 years, ever since Thomas, one of the disciples, arrived in India to talk about the teachings of Jesus. While most people here are Buddhist, just like when I was in Nepal last week, they get along mostly well with the Christians, who mostly live in the northwestern part of the country.

Yesterday I visited a new church in Colombo, the capital of Sri Lanka. For many of the people there, it was the first time they had their own building to gather in – before that, they met in kitchens, in fire departments, even outside in a park. They said it meant everything to be with their friends and family in their own space to make the world a better place.

It reminds me of St. John's. Love your neighbors, hold them close, and promise to find a way to make tomorrow a little better.

Though this number doesn't include all suicides, we will also include the names of trans people locally who we know took their own lives due to anti-trans intimidation & bullying.
