

With acolytes and processions, communal singing, and a mission to love and serve our neighbors, this service invites one to participate in the coming of the Kingdom.

A word about the "Mass of Creation" which we will use during October and November: Each year, the ecumenical church celebrates the "Season of Creation", culminating with the Feast of St. Francis, on October 4th. For us, the Blessing of the Animals takes place on that same day. Through the month of October, in our Sunday School classes, Adult Forums, and with the choir in worship, we remember that we are now in a "season of prayer and action" for the "protectors of our common home". Our worship will be guided by the work of Marty Haugen's "Mass of Creation", which remembers St. Francis and his ministry and through musical settings of St. Francis' prayer/poem, "All Creatures of our God and King."



THE FIRST LESSON: Daniel 7:9-10,13-14 (please be seated for the readings)

As I watched, thrones were set in place, and an Ancient One took his throne, his clothing was white as snow, and the hair of his head like pure wool; his throne was fiery flames, and its wheels were burning fire. A stream of fire issued and flowed out from his presence. A thousand thousands served him, and ten thousand times ten thousand stood attending him. SERMON

THE REV. AMANDA KNOUSE

THE NICENE CREED (please rise in body or spirit)



Because you sent your beloved Son to redeem us from sin and death, and to make us heirs in him of everlasting life; that when he shall come again in power and great triumph to judge the world, we may without shame or fear rejoice to behold his appearing. Therefore we praise you, joining our voices with Angels and Archangels and with all the company of heaven, who forever sing this hymn to proclaim the glory of your Name:

THE SANCTUS



Glory and honor and praise to you, holy and living God. To deliver us from the power of sin and death and to reveal the riches of your grace, you looked with favor upon Mary, your willing servant, that she might conceive and bear a son, Jesus the holy child of God. Living among us, Jesus loved us. He broke bread with outcasts and sinners, healed the sick, and proclaimed good news to the poor. He yearned to draw all the world to himself yet we were heedless of his call to walk in love.

Then the time came for him to complete upon the cross the sacrifice of his life, and to be glorified by you. On the night before he died for us, Jesus was at table with his friends. He took bread, gave thanks to you, broke it, and gave it to them, and said: "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

As supper was ending, Jesus took the cup of wine. Again he gave thanks to you, gave it to them, and said: "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is poured out for you and for all for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

Now gathered at your table, O God of all creation, and remembering Christ crucified and risen, who was and is and is to come, we offer to you our gifts of bread and wine, and ourselves, a living sacrifice.

Pour out your Spirit upon these gifts that they may be the Body and Blood of Christ. Breathe your Spirit over the whole earth and make us your new creation, the Body of Christ given for the world you have made.

In the fullness of time bring us, with all your saints, from every tribe and language and people and nation, to feast at the banquet prepared from the foundation of the world. Through Christ and with Christ and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, to you be honor, glory, and praise, for ever and ever. Amen.

St. John's Traveler Letter:

Did you know St. John's has a team of pilgrims who travel to the very we pray for in the Anglican communion? Follow John as he shares about the church and the places he visits:

Dear Pastor Amanda,

Hola from the small city of Puno in the Andes Mountains! This week I write to you from Peru in South America on the shores of Lake Titicaca, one of the highest and largest lakes in the world. While we're not as high up as I was when I was at Everest Base Camp in Nepal a few weeks ago, I still find myself struggling to catch a deep breath every now and again.

This area was first settled hundreds of years ago by the Inca people. You may know them as the same group that built Machu Picchu, several hundred miles to the northwest. It's been a magical few days here recognizing Puno Week, which celebrates the birth of Manco Capac, the founder of the Inca civilization. According to legend, he rose from the bottom of Lake Titicaca to found the empire.

Today, a huge procession of boats floats across the lake to celebrate. Big boats, small boats, sailboats, and motorboats. Boats of all different shapes and sizes and colors. Some boats flew kites while others blasted loud music. Everyone came together to celebrate, eat, drink, and dance, and a few people went swimming in the clear, blue water.

After several days of celebration, I knew I needed some time for myself so I took a boat to the island of Taquile in the middle of the lake in search of peace. Taquile is known for having some of the best weavers in all of Peru - and they did not disappoint. I left the island wearing my new hat (called a chullo) and feeling ready for the weeks and months ahead. My hope for you all is no matter what you did or felt this past weekend, you find a way in which to prepare yourself for the upcoming season of Advent.
