

Celebrant The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

In the fifteenth year of the reign of Emperor Tiberius, when Pontius Pilate was governor of Judea, and Herod was ruler of Galilee, and his brother Philip ruler of the region of Ituraea and Trachonitis, and Lysanias ruler of Abilene, during the high priesthood of Annas and Caiaphas, the word of God came to John son of Zechariah in the wilderness. He went into all the region around the Jordan, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins, as it is written in the book of the words of the prophet Isaiah, "The voice of one crying out in the wilderness: 'Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight. It is customary to kneel during Advent.

We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In him, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

On the night before he died for us, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore, according to his command, O Father,

We remember his death, We proclaim his resurrection, We await his coming in glory;


And we offer our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving to you, O Lord of all; presenting to you, from your creation, this bread and this wine.

St. John's Traveler Letter:

Did you know St. John's has pilgrims who travel the very places we pray for in the Anglican communion? Follow John as he shares about the church and the places he visits:

Dear Pastor Amanda,

This is a difficult letter to write, and I imagine for you to read. While you're praying for the Province of the Episcopal Church of Sudan, I'm not there. I'm writing from Adre in Chad, just across the western border of Sudan. Sudan is a war zone, and it's not a safe place to be. War has been raging since April of 2023 between the Sudanese Armed Forces (SAF) and the Rapid Support Forces (RSF). These are two militaries that were each a part of the former government, and they're now battling each other. The United Nations unanimously imposed an arms embargo on both sides, but neither of them is willing to enter peace talks. They each believe they can only end the conflict by destroying the other. Of course, the people are caught in the middle. One ray of hope is the government has agreed to open the border here at Adre for three months to allow relief supplies in for people in the nearby refugee camp of el-Geneina.

Sudan is predominantly a Muslim country. When South Sudan gained its independence from Sudan in 2011 it provided refuge for many Christians. However there are still about 2 and a half million Christians in Sudan itself, and the government announced its intent to be a strictly Muslim country, operating under Sharia law. When this war began in April of 2013 one of the first attacks was on the Anglican Cathedral in Khartoum. The priests and nuns were forced to leave, and the building was then used as a military base.

I understand this war isn't often talked about in the US media. You'll hear about Gaza and Lebanon and Ukraine. Sudan is sometimes referred to as a land of little concern, although the fighting here is just as brutal. I'm sorry to bring you such hard news in an otherwise joyous season, but I'd like to think your awareness and prayers will send a spirit of hope to the many that are suffering here.
