

Now if Christ is proclaimed as raised from the dead, how can some of you say there is no resurrection of the dead? If there is no resurrection of the dead, then Christ has not been raised; and if Christ has not been raised, then our proclamation has been in vain and your faith has been in vain. We are even found to be misrepresenting God, because we testified of God that he raised Christ--whom he did not raise if it is true that the dead are not raised. For if the dead are not raised, then Christ has not been raised. If Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile and you are still in your sins. Then those also who have died in Christ have perished. If for this life only we have hoped in Christ, we are of all people most to be pitied. But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have died.

THE HOLY GOSPEL: Luke 5:1-11 (please remain standing as you are able)

CelebrantThe Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.PeopleGlory to you, Lord Christ.

Once while Jesus was standing beside the lake of Gennesaret, and the crowd was pressing in on him to hear the word of God, he saw two boats there at the shore of the lake; the fishermen had gone out of them and were washing their nets. He got into one of the boats, the one belonging to Simon, and asked him to put out a little way from the shore. Then he sat down and taught the crowds from the boat. When he had finished speaking, he said to Simon, "Put out into the deep water and let down your nets for a catch." Simon answered, "Master, we have worked all night long but have caught nothing. Yet if you say so, I will let down the nets." When they had done this, they caught so many fish that their nets were beginning to break. So they signaled their partners in the other boat to come and help them. And they came and filled both boats, so that they began to sink. But when Simon Peter saw it, he fell down at Jesus' knees, saying, "Go away from me, Lord, for I am a sinful man!" For he and all who were with him were amazed at the catch of fish that they had taken; and so also were James and John, sons of Zebedee, who were partners with Simon. Then Jesus said to Simon, "Do not be afraid; from now on you will be catching people." When they had brought their boats to shore, they left everything and followed him.

SERMON

THE REV. FAITH D'URBANO

THE NICENE CREED (please rise in body or spirit)

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

Therefore, according to his command, O Father,


We remember his death, We proclaim his resurrection, We await his coming in glory;

St. John's Traveler Letter:

Did you know St. John's has a team of pilgrims who travel every week to the very places we pray for in the Anglican communion? Follow John as he shares a little bit about the church and the places he visits:

Dear Pastor Amanda,

Hello this week from Joypurhat (where?). I've left the mountains of New Zealand, the vast Outback and endless surf of Australia, and am now in the low lying farmlands of southern Asia. Bangladesh has a coastline on the Bay of Bengal, and much of the land is less than 10 meters (33 feet) above sea level. While this country has one of the lowest CO2 emission rates in the world, the people here are affected more by climate change, rising sea levels, and floods from ever increasing torrential rains than most people in other areas. It's evidence that everything we do benefits or hurts others, too.

The land and people of Bangladesh predate recorded history. The country has developed as a nation in fairly recent history. From the 1300's this was known as Bengal. It was conquered and occupied by British colonialism in the 1700's, which brought Anglicanism to the people. This was a part of India, then Pakistan when that country was created in a split from India, and finally gained its own independence in 1971. Just as indigenous people the world over have been overrun by stronger and more industrially advanced nations, the people and the land of Bangladesh have been fought over since people have been fighting over land and resources.

Joypurhat is a city with a population about the size of Lancaster, and home to the largest sugar mill in the country! The Anglican Church here is one of the Uniting Churches. Christians are very much in the minority here, so several denominations came together to collaborate and share resources. Islam is the predominant faith in this area, and just as in Christianity there are progressive and conservative Muslims. Sadly, many conservatives gathered here last week and tore down a local soccer field because it was about to host a match between two girls' teams. According to their true faithful beliefs, girls should not be allowed to play sports and so they felt called to stop the match from happening. It's a lesson for all of us: what does our faith call us to do for others, and are there things our faith calls us to stop others from doing? Everything we do for ourselves benefits or hurts others, too. Pray that all people, here, there, and everywhere, continue to learn how to be respectful of each other.
