RECTOR'S MESSAGE



Dear St. John's,

It's hard to believe Lent is upon us! Beginning on Ash Wednesday, March 5th, we will enter into the 40+ days set aside each year to reflect, pray, and nurture our relationships with Christ and each other. I have always loved this season and the introspective work it invites us into.

Lent is countercultural - it speaks of slowing down when the world says speed up. It invites us repent, when the world tells us not to worry about how we impact others. Lent challenges us to fast, give, and pray when the world encourages us to feast, take, and use. For forty days, we are encouraged to take on spiritual practices, kneel a little longer in worship as we acknowledge our brokenness, and create a little more space in our hearts for Christ to enter in. It's a holy and life giving season, and yes, it requires a little work on our part!

This Lent, rather than giving something up, I'm feeling the urge to take something on, but not just anything. I feel the Spirit inviting me (and perhaps, you feel the urge, too), to engage in a spiritual discipline that's outside of my norm. There are countless disciplines to consider. Perhaps, we could:

- Begin a daily gratitude journal
- Pray one of the daily offices from the Book of Common Prayer
- Spend 15 minutes a day in real silence
- Devote a few minutes each day to read through a book of the Bible
- Listen to a soul nurturing podcast or watch a series such as "The Chosen"
- Walk the labyrinth each week

There are so many opportunities to enter into the holy season. My prayer for our parish is we take the time to discern what might soften our hearts and nurture our relationships the most over the next forty days. 

LENTEN PROGRAM - AN INQUIRER'S CLASS WEDNESDAY IN LENT 5:30-7:00 PM



WALK IN LOVE: EPISCOPAL BELIEFS AND PRACTICES

Take a journey through *The Book of Common Prayer*, the Christian life, and basic beliefs of our faith, guided by two Episcopal priests--Scott Gunn and Melody Wilson Shobe. Walk through the liturgical year, the sacraments of the church, habits of daily prayer, and the teachings of Anglican Christianity. See how our prayer shapes our belief and our lives and how our beliefs lead us into a deeper relationship with Jesus Christ.

This class is for anyone who wants to learn more about the Episcopal Church, those who would like to be confirmed or received as official members when the bishop visits on May 4, or for those who are just curious! MUSINGS FROM THE ORGAN BENCH

Ye joyful bells, ring out your praise, that we our hearts to God may raise; Ring out above our mortal strife, and hail the Lord of love and life. (anonymous)

For well over a 1000 years, bells and the Christian faith have resonated together. In towns large and the small, in this and other parts of the world where the Christian faith is found, the sound of bells calls believers to praise and prayer. From small bells to huge...the sound of a bell is special and enriching of our lives. Bells tolling at the death of a person or the pealing of bells at joyful times expresses in sound, what is in our hearts.

At St. John's we hear the bell ringing from our tower as we begin worship each Sunday. We hear the ringing of the Sanctus bells (four small bells) several times in our worship at points of the consecration of the elements, and at the time of the creed, reminding us of the very presence of Christ in our midst. From time to time thel "tinkly" bells of the organ's Zimbelstern ringing randomly bring an element of delight to our souls. On occasion, the chimes of the organ ring out familiar melodies.

St. John's has a set of bells we call "handbells" and we have a set of "hand chimes". Over the years, St. John's has been blessed with dedicated ringers that present special music in the form of the sound of bells. Handbells such as ours, were originally created so that a group of eight ringers could practice "change ringing" before moving to the tower to do the same with the tower bells...! Eventually more than eight bells were created by foundries such as Whitechapel Foundry in London, England, which made Big Ben by way and was the oldest existing bell foundry until it closed in 2017.


Some time in the future, a set of Whitechapel change ringing bells (a peal of bells) will be displayed and played. More about Change ringing at another time, but to hear a full peal of bells takes three and one half hours...without mistakes. I experienced this while at a Washington College of Preachers conference. The College is just down the hill from the National Cathedral so I had first "ear" experience with a full peal while trying to pay attention to the lecturer!

All this to say that bells are an important part of our worshipping community as we hear them played in worship. Even more, a handbell choir is a wonderful small group experience that supports one another. In the past year, we have lost three of our longtime ringers and are in need of "new blood" to keep this musical ministry alive.

Our next time to play will be during the Easter Season, most likely the first service on Easter Sunday. We practice on Thursday evenings from 7-8:30 p.m. and would like to invite young and old to join in playing. This group has currently 5 ringers (counting myself) and I would like to see 3 or 4 more "newbies" to join our ringing for God's glory and our worship. If your are inspired to try your hand and bell ringing, let me know via email, phone call or stopping me after worship in the coming weeks. Blessings!

Caring Ministry Update

WE NEED YOU!

Caring Ministries is asking for volunteers for our five areas of ministry. Please sign up in the parish hall at the Caring Ministry booth which will be featuring sign up sheets and members who will answer questions during Sundays in March. The five areas of ministry are Eucharistic Visitors, Transportation, Phone Connections, Faith Friends (Home Visits), and Card Ministry.

Eucharistic Visitors

• What is a Eucharistic Visitor?

Eucharistic Visitors are lay persons trained and licensed by the Diocese and sent forth by the congregation to take the Eucharist to persons who cannot attend St John's for regular services. Those discerning this ministry, should discuss it with the Rector, complete Safe Church training, and attend a training session conducted by Deacon Jane Miron. New Eucharistic Ministers will be paired up with someone already trained for initial visits. Brother David is the Eucharistic Visitor contact.

To learn more about this important ministry, you are invited to attend an information session about being a Eucharistic Visitor on Sunday, March 16. Eucharistic Minister training will be held on the morning of Saturday, April 26. Please mark your calendars!

Transportation Ministry

• What is Transportation Ministry?

Card Ministry

• What is the Card Ministry?

SOLE4SOULS - A FEW STATS & THOUGHTS BY BARBARA LANDIS

Thanks to Soles4Souls and their commitment to saving the planet, 9,153,812 pounds of discarded shoes and clothing were saved from landfills having sent used goods to good use in 137 countries, Puerto Rico, and the US Virgin Islands.

78,656 pairs of shoes and pieces of clothing have been provided to hurricane survivors in North Carolina, South Carolina, Florida and Tennessee, offering comfort and dignity to those who lost everything in the wake of Hurricanes Milton and Helene.

Through our 4EveryKind program, 209,000 children experiencing homelessness in the US, received brand new athletic shoes, making it possible for kids to attend school more regularly, participate in extracurricular activities and feel like they fit in....the power of shoes.

Entrepreneurs in Haiti, Honduras, Dominican Republic, Guatemala, Moldova, Transnistria, Chile, Belize and the Philippines participated in their 40pportunity program, reselling shoes and clothes in their communities, making it possible to send their kids to school, improve family health and nutrition, and break the cycle of poverty.

St. John's, you can't imagine the smiles I get when people bring shoes to me to donate or send emails about donating and what helps others, helps them with the release of guilt of "stuff" being in their house and not wanting to trash them.

A friend who dropped off shoes at church has another friend who works at the recycle shop in Mt. Joy. After hearing about our participating in Soles4Souls, they donated the shoes from their shop that hadn't been sold. The smiles on their faces said it all knowing those shoes were going to make a difference instead of being a burden on their shelves.

Shoes are more than an accessory, they are a life line. Please consider donating your shoes before Good Friday! Bins are located outside of the Parish Hall.



CHESTNUT STREET FENCE MINISTRY



Martha's Ministry has been keeping a record of the number of donated items that grace our fence: warm hats, scarves, gloves and socks. These items are placed on the fence for those in need.

Since the first chill in October 2024 until the end of December 2024, we have provided:

- 58 scarves
- 123 hats
- 27 pairs of gloves
- 94 pairs of socks
- 3 cowls
- 11 headbands or earmuffs

The month of January 2025 has given us the coldest temperatures since 1994. We provided:

- 73 scarves
- 52 hats
- 24 gloves
- 46 socks
- 8 cowls
- 1 headband or earmuff

We are challenged to keep up with the demand and would like to thank those who have helped carry this ministry forward. Thank you to Ewebiquitous of Lititz, The Sit and Sip group also from Lititz, our neighbors here in Lancaster and our parish family as well as those who attend Martha's Ministry.

Donations of new and gently used clean items are welcomed and very much needed.

FINANCIALS BY CHARLES WEAR, TREASURER

We recorded an operating surplus of \$23.1k for January, which is typical of historic income trends for the beginning of a new year. The surplus would have been even larger save for December medical premiums paid in January. Income surged due to a single \$35k non-pledged contribution and the 2024 ExtraGive receipts of \$13.5k for the food pantry.

Electricity ran high for the month, not too surprising given the cold weather and our almost total conversion from gas heat. Looking back at total energy costs for December and January over a 5-year period, our new HVAC system appears to be delivering improved efficiencies and lower overall operating costs. Another roof leak and associated damage have been discovered in one of the auditorium stairwells. Estimated repair is \$13.3k, which will be covered by insurance after a \$5k deductible. The deductible will be a February or March expense.

Concord 209 requires work on the main sewer line servicing the property. Total repair job will be \$9.3k. A 50% down payment was made in January, which essentially meets our annual budgeted maintenance allowance for this property. Funds will be reimbursed from our restricted reserve account at year end.

Major capital expenses for January include \$11.0k to Skyline to complete the sanctuary floor and \$14.3k to Saltzer & Son as a deposit to repair the auditorium (and other) windows. Capital gifts of \$4.3k were received in January, bringing the total for the project to \$720.9k. Bequests and pre-campaign donations bring the grand total received to \$834.5k. An additional \$272.2k in pledges is outstanding. Overall, we are about \$95k short of the campaign goal.
