A MESSAGE FROM THE RECTOR



Dear St. John's.

As a visual learner, I've always found Holy Week to be overwhelming. For seven days, I experience emotional overload as the images of Christ's last days are played out in worship and song. Our journey begins with the triumphant entry of Jesus into Jerusalem with the waving of palms and shouts of Hosanna. The mood is ecstatic and contagious. But it doesn't last. Within days, I picture Jesus sitting around a table with his friends. With a command to love one another he shows them what that love looks like with an incredible act of humility. He stoops down and washes their tired, dirty, sore feet. I then envision the bread and wine he offers being passed around the table one disciple at a time. He begs of them to remember him through the sharing of a meal. He knows their memories will have to see them through.

Next, we encounter Jesus' struggle in the garden as he lays his heart out to his father. I see the crown of thorns piercing his forehead. I see Pontius Pilate trying to wash his hands of the task that is set before him. And then, as if we didn't know what was coming, the image of the cross looms over us casting the shadow of death as far as our eyes can see. It's dark, and tragic, and inconceivable to imagine our Messiah taking his last breath as he's mocked, tortured, and doubted by the very people he loves.

Although, all of these images are moving and deserve our attention, there is one that cuts me even deeper. It comes from a simple, yet profound saying, "Nails didn't hold Jesus to the cross, love did." Holy Week is the journey of a man in love with God's people and the sacrifices he was willing to make to show us that love. Love is what brought Jesus to Jerusalem and love is what delivered him from the power of death. The empty tomb, the greatest image of Christianity, is made possible because love always triumphs over evil. Light always casts out darkness. Life, with Christ, always defeats death. In the end, love always wins.

This month, I invite you to pay attention to the images of Holy Week. Take the necessary time to really reflect on Jesus' last days through worship, song, and prayer. Perhaps you'll see something you've never noticed before. Perhaps you'll encounter the empty tomb with fresh eyes and discover a world already in the midst of being resurrected.

TRAINING AT ST. JOHN'S ON SATURDAY, APRIL 26 FROM 9:00-11:00AM

So, what is a Eucharistic Visitor? Eucharistic Visitors are lay persons who have discerned to take Holy Communion to those not able to attend Church services. Eucharistic Visitors receive training and are licensed by the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania and St. John's. Visits are a time of prayer, sharing, and fellowship as well as distributing Communion. Persons who would like to participate in this special ministry should speak to the Rector and take the required "Safe Church" certification courses.

MUSINGS FROM THE ORGAN BENCH

Alleluia! Christ is risen! Those words are certainly familiar for those of us celebrate who with joy, resurrection of Jesus Christ. In looking through choral music to sing through the Easter season I worked through the master notebooks of choral music that's in our library. It was there that I discovered an anthem that, when it was new, cost \$0.16. Yes, that's been guite a while! When I looked at the anthem, by Russian composer, Andre Kopolyoff, the words were rather unique and different for Easter Sunday. It's an Easter anthem that is from the Orthodox Church such as found in Ukraine and Russia and it has some unique vocal techniques which were humorous to say the least, when we sang through it at a recent choir rehearsal.

This year for Easter Sunday two special choral things will take place within the late worship service. One will be this orthodox anthem celebrating coming of spring, the planting of crops, and the coming again of the risen Christ. The reason for doing this is because the orthodox celebration of Easter falls on the same day as the community's Christian western celebration of Easter on Sunday, April 20th. A most rare occurrence. We're going to sing this anthem as a way of highlighting and drawing attention in a musical way to the need for ongoing prayers for the people in Ukraine who continue to suffer through a war that has killed thousands and displaced thousands and has been devastating not just to Ukraine but to the thousands of young soldiers and their families, who have died in battle.

There will be celebrations of Easter in eastern European countries at the same time that we celebrate Easter in the West. The prayer is that we would think as one, as our Book of Common Prayer reminds us. Our worship unifies and connects us.

The second thing that we will be doing in worship at the late service is joining our voices together for the 'Hallelujah Chorus' by George Frederick Handel. If you've never sung the chorus and would like to join, that's great; if you've sung it and it's been a long time since you sang in the choir, you're welcome, too; anyone interested is invited to come up and sing the Hallelujah chorus with us. Hallelujah, Christ is risen!

Bravura Brass will assist in the service and the sounds of the glorious Easter music will resound with organ, voices and brass to remind us again.... "The Lord is Risen Indeed"!



FINANCIALS BY CHARLES WEAR, TREASURER

Operating income rebounded in February and expenses met budget. The result was a \$9.7k surplus for the month and \$32.8k year to date. Overall, it was a very routine month. There were no major transactions in our non-operating accounts. The change in investment account balances primarily reflects market movement.

Capital gifts of \$14.1k were received in February, bringing the total for the project to \$744.1k. Bequests and pre-campaign donations bring the grand total received to \$859.0k. An additional \$248.2k in pledges is outstanding. Overall, we remain about \$95k short of the campaign goal.

The Willet proposal of \$84.3K to refurbish all the windows in the sanctuary has been added to the project estimate. This brings the total project estimated cost to \$1.24 million. The only major capital expense in February was the monthly \$5.7k debt service for the Heistand loan, which has a current balance of \$172.9k.

CONFIRMATION RECEPTION REAFFIRMATION

With the Bishop's visit officially on the books (May 4), it is time to begin our preparations for her visit! One of the roles of our bishop is the Confirmation, Reception, and Reaffirmation of members of the parish.

Youth and adults are regularly confirmed, making this choice for themselves to affirm their baptismal vows. For those who may have been confirmed in another denomination (Roman Catholic, Eastern Orthodox, Lutheran, Moravian, etc.) the Prayer Book provides for Reception, whereby one is formally received into The Episcopal Church, honoring the commitment one made in their previous denomination.

The rite of Reaffirmation is celebrated with a confirmed Episcopalian who, for personal reasons, wishes to publicly reaffirm their baptismal vows to the bishop and the community. In both reception and reaffirmation, we pray that the Holy Spirit continues to transform and deepen the candidates' faith.
