Juneteenth, celebrated on June 19th, commemorates the emancipation of enslaved people in Texas in 1865. It's a day of remembrance and celebration of freedom, recognizing the delay in news of the Emancipation Proclamation reaching enslaved people in the state. Juneteenth is often celebrated with family gatherings, picnics, speeches, and religious services. It's also a time for reflection on the history of slavery and the ongoing struggle for equality and justice. Living into our baptismal covenants, St. John's stands with those still fighting for freedom, equality, and justice!

Landis Valley Village & Farm Museum is proud to announce that it will host Lancaster's annual Juneteenth Celebration on Thursday, June 19, 2025. Organized in partnership with the Lancaster Chapter of the National Action Network (NAN), this year's event marks a historic first for Landis Valley as part of our 100th Anniversary celebration—a year dedicated to honoring community, heritage, and the diverse stories that shape Pennsylvania's past.

Juneteenth in Lancaster has a legacy rooted in the Strawberry Street Festival, the earliest known African American celebration in the county, believed to date back to 1905. Revived in 1997 by Paul Culbreth and Darlene Colon as a Juneteenth event at Thaddeus Stevens College, this celebration has grown into a cherished tradition honoring emancipation and African American culture. Now, for the first time, Landis Valley is honored to serve as the host site for this living history experience, aligned with our mission to preserve and interpret the full spectrum of Pennsylvania's heritage.

Event Highlights Include:

- Historical reenactments and performances by the acclaimed PA Past Players
- Live gospel choirs performing spirituals and songs of the emancipation era
- A diverse array of vendors and food trucks, spotlighting African American-owned businesses and traditional cuisine

MUSINGS FROM THE ORGAN BENCH



Last fall, during the month of October we used Marty Haugen's Mass of Creation all month long to celebrate St. Francis of Assisi. Marty Haugen is a noted composer who has been a prolific composer for the Lutheran church in particular and for the rest of us in the worshipping church. One of his hymns, which is part of the ELW (Evangelical Lutheran Worship, copyright 2006), is entitled "Soli Deo Gloria" (To God alone be Glory).

Members of the Lancaster Chapter of the American Guild of Organists, of which I have served as Dean twice (and several other positions over my 55 years of membership...wow...time flies!!), use this hymn each year at our Annual Banquet, thanks to it's introduction by Dr. Karl Moyer...another long-time member of the chapter. The first verse and fifth verse, written by Marty (who authored both the words and music, copyright 1989, GIA Publications), reflect aspects of the musical experience at St. John's. Marty wrote: "O God of blessings, all praise to you! Your love surrounds us our whole life through, You are the freedom of those oppressed, you are the comfort of all distressed. Come now, O holy and welcome guest: Soli Deo gloria! Soli Deo gloria!. A billion voices in one great song, now soft and gentle, now deep and strong, in every culture and style and key, from hill and valley with sky and sea, with Christ we praise you eternally: Soli Deo gloria! Soli Deo gloria! (Hymn 878, ELW)

The Latin ending of each verse, is also a phrase that Johann Sebastian Bach included in the title area of his compositions. His whole life was intentionally focused on giving God the glory for all that he, as a masterful musician, was able to produce.

This summer, at each of our Sunday services, besides the hymns and music of the liturgy, and the voices of the pipes in the organ, we will be blessed with special music of a variety of styles, messages, and groupings. We will have at least one guest from outside our congregation in addition to the sharing through music, of the many talents that are a part of our blessed congregation. Whether you are traveling or coming to Sunday worship, I encourage you to be a part of worship, as we have it live, in person, streaming, or "after the fact" via online recordings of our worship.

FINANCIALS BY TREASURER, CHARLES WEAR

- Operating expenses and income were close to budget levels in April, which resulted in a small monthly deficit of \$5.1k. We are still running a surplus YTD of \$36.1k based on above favorable income and expenses at the beginning of the year.
- April is the first month reflecting the hire of our new assistant priest effective April 13. Staffing costs for the month were further inflated by paying both April and March health insurance premiums in the month.
- Worship costs were up due to organ tuning and Easter brass expenses. These expenses will eventually be reconciled against applicable music reserve accounts.
- Capital gifts of \$16.7k were received in April, bringing the total gifts for the project to \$768.1k. Additional one-time bequests and pre-campaign donations bring the grand total to \$883.8k, with \$227.7k in pledges outstanding. The estimated total project cost remains at \$1.24 million, leaving \$129.7k as additional need.
- Besides the monthly debt service for the Heistand loan, the only major capital expense in April was a \$16.5k installment payment to Willet for the Mary window.
