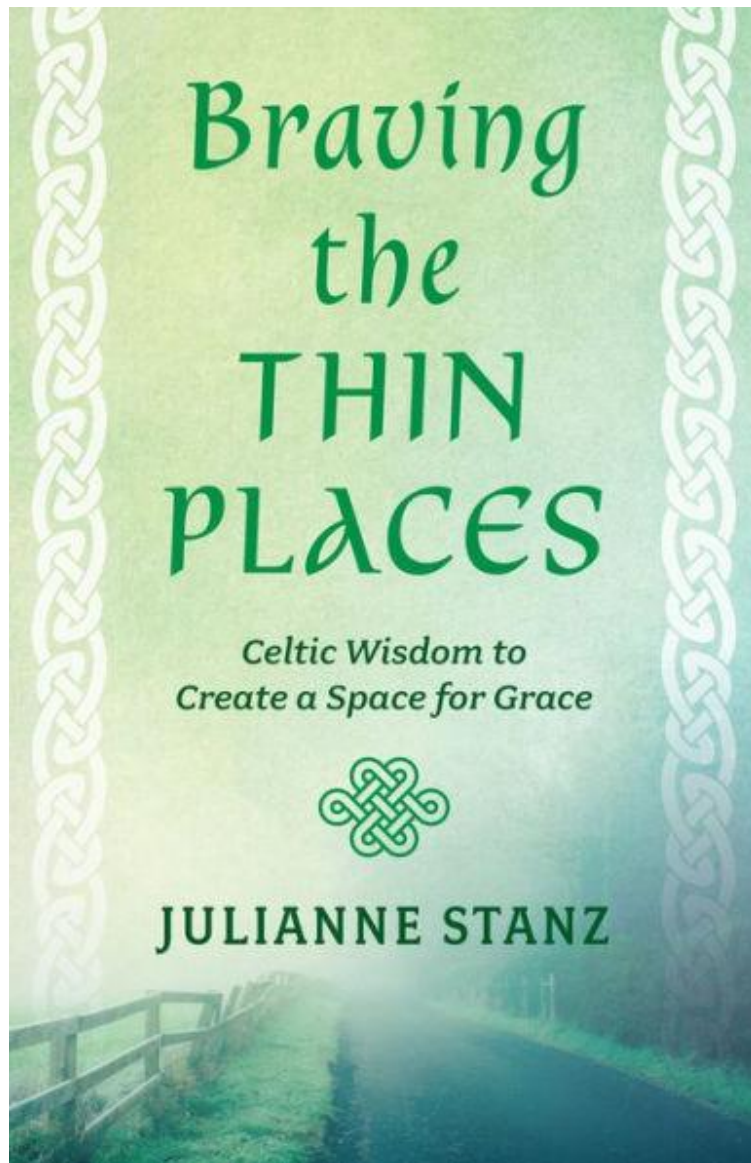

Six Month Report from Your St. John's Food Pantry

Dear Friends,

We would like to share the status of the St. John's Food Pantry for the period of January 1, 2025, through June 30, 2025, as well as some unique concerns for the 2025 calendar year.

Financial Picture:

Thanks to the bulk buying team headed by Liz and Paul West, we have been incredibly fortunate to realize big savings in our bulk purchases from the Central PA Food Bank, the Blessings of Hope purchasing team of Karen DiPace and Deb Smith, and a unique direct gift-in-kind from a generous church member.

Central PA Food Bank Report:

We received a very helpful updated report from the Central PA Food Bank with six month-to-date numbers regarding Food Insecurity in Pennsylvania, changes in the 2025 Federal Budget impacting Central PA Food Bank, and changes in the 2025 state of PA support to try to cover some of these losses. We are placing a copy of the update on our Food Pantry display table in the Parish Hall if you would like to learn more.

Summary:

Concerns: Food costs continue to rise. Demand continues to increase likely more in the next six months. Items we purchased at low costs from Central PA Food Bank have already disappeared from the inventory lists of items to purchase. Items we obtain from Blessings of Hope (rice and pasta) are scarce and frequently unavailable.

Blessings: We have the amazing support of our church members. We have hard working volunteers (almost 60 total in every part of the ministry) doing an incredible job. We continue to seek support from interested individuals and groups outside of St. John's.

We thank you, St. John's, and our Father in Heaven, for helping make this ministry possible!

MUSINGS FROM THE ORGAN BENCH....



“Sing a New Song Unto the Lord” are the words to a song that was composed by Dan Schutte (check out: [Sing a New Song](#) on YouTube). It has remained a favorite of mine since the days when I co-directed a summer camp for junior high youth (roughly 90 very active boys and girls). By the end of the week, I had those 90 youth singing this song at full voice and even with smiles on their faces! Yes, even the ‘rough and tough’ boys from the Bronx and Queens (who introduced me to break dancing when it was popular)...sang with gusto and lots of energy!!!

It's hard to believe that summer is almost over and we begin again with our two worship services, which include the return of the Chancel Choir leading us with the music accompanied by our wonderful sanctuary organ and piano. And not forgetting the sound of bells, which is another wonderful addition to our worship music remind me of the song “Ring the Bells of Heaven”. The Chancel Choir will begin to rehearse again on Wednesdays, beginning on September 3rd in preparation for our return to singing for the first time on “Homecoming Sunday”, September 7th. The Bell choir will begin the next evening, September 4th at 7 p.m. I know that there are those who have indicated a desire to join the chancel choir or the bell choir! Those are dates for you to mark on your calendar. There is space for more as we begin working with some of the wonderful music in our choral and bell choir libraries as well as some new pieces that I will introduce, one of which is the Song of St. Cecilia, which we will sing in November, hopefully at an Evensong service along with a setting for Evensong by Ralph Vaughn Williams (in our library). Another is one that I just heard today by Stephen Paulus (YouTube clip: https://youtu.be/Z_ond8aVhHA) entitled “The Road Home”, based on an 1830's shaped note hymn, which I plan to use on All Saints Sunday.

When the choir sings (or the bells play) and when the congregation sings with full voices, the hymns that are well known and loved, we are experiencing just a foretaste of heaven. In a blog entitled “The Choir, A Reflection of Heaven” by Genia Holder-Cozart, has written (rightly in my opinion and philosophy of church music) “when we see our friends and family in the choir, singing in harmony of voice and spirit, I believe we are momentarily transported to the throne room of Heaven”.

remind us aurally, of the congregation of the angels in heaven. In the Wieskirche in Bavaria, one finds painted in the ceiling of the church, above the organ, the doors of heaven opening surrounded by angels singing. Keep that in mind when it comes to what we do with the music in worship. Finally, read the Hallel Psalms (the praise psalms...Psalm 146-150...which all begin with the words.... "Praise the Lord"!

TREASURER'S REPORT



- A small deficit was posted for June operations primarily due to over-budget electricity costs. Clergy costs ran lower for the month to correct overpayment in May. Our YTD operating surplus of \$75.6k includes the \$65k Lyet/Summy bequest that will eventually be divided and moved to the endowment and capital accounts as specified by Vestry.
- A \$5.0k donation from Prince of Peace (Gettysburg) was received to defray our costs for hosting the immigration clinic.
- The Music and Instrumental restricted funds were merged as recommended by the Finance Committee and adopted by Vestry. The new fund "Music and Instrumentalists" has a current balance of \$18.0k.
- Value of our investment accounts increased due to reinvested interest and dividend income as well as market gains.
- Capital gifts of \$5.1k were received in June, bringing the total for the project to \$782.0k. Additional one-time bequests and pre-campaign donations bring the grand total to \$898.3k, with an additional \$214.5k in pledges outstanding. The estimated total project cost remains at \$1.24 million, leaving \$128.5k as additional need.
- Capital expenses for the month totaled \$50.2k. Major items included a \$28.2k installment for the Mary window, lift rental for accessing auditorium windows, chimney removal, floor repairs and our monthly Heistand loan service.

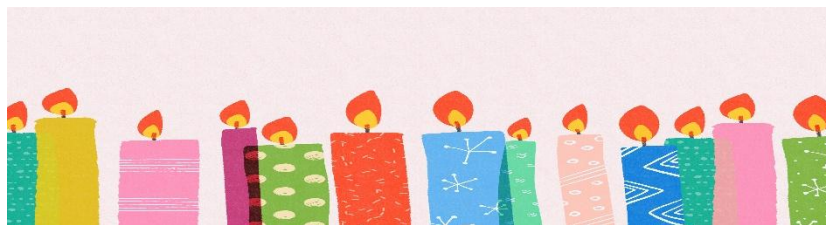
