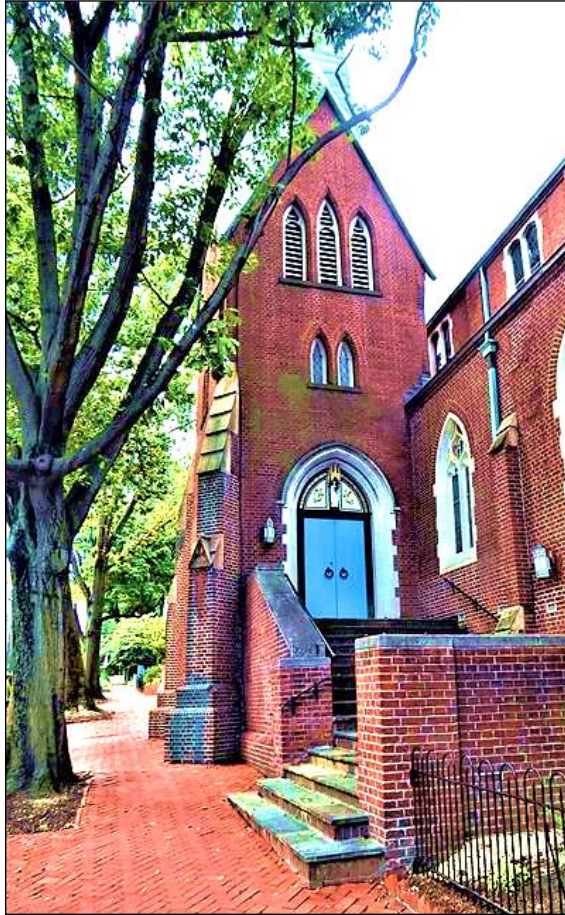

THE FIRST LESSON: Isaiah 5:1-7 *(please be seated for the readings)*

Let me sing for my beloved
my love-song concerning his vineyard:

My beloved had a vineyard
on a very fertile hill.
He dug it and cleared it of stones,
and planted it with choice vines;
he built a watchtower in the midst of it,
and hewed out a wine vat in it;
he expected it to yield grapes,
but it yielded wild grapes.

THE SECOND LESSON: Hebrews 11:29-12:2

By faith the people passed through the Red Sea as if it were dry land, but when the Egyptians attempted to do so they were drowned. By faith the walls of Jericho fell after they had been encircled for seven days. By faith Rahab the prostitute did not perish with those who were disobedient, because she had received the spies in peace.

And what more should I say? For time would fail me to tell of Gideon, Barak, Samson, Jephthah, of David and Samuel and the prophets-- who through faith conquered

kingdoms, administered justice, obtained promises, shut the mouths of lions, quenched raging fire, escaped the edge of the sword, won strength out of weakness, became mighty in war, put foreign armies to flight. Women received their dead by resurrection. Others were tortured, refusing to accept release, in order to obtain a better resurrection. Others suffered mocking and flogging, and even chains and imprisonment. They were stoned to death, they were sawn in two, they were killed by the sword; they went about in skins of sheep and goats, destitute, persecuted, tormented-- of whom the world was not worthy. They wandered in deserts and mountains, and in caves and holes in the ground.

Yet all these, though they were commended for their faith, did not receive what was promised, since God had provided something better so that they would not, apart from us, be made perfect.

Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight and the sin that clings so closely, and let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus the pioneer and perfecter of our faith, who for the sake of the joy that was set before him endured the cross, disregarding its shame, and has taken his seat at the right hand of the throne of God.

Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ. By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever.

St. John's Traveler Letter:

Did you know St. John's has a team of pilgrims who travel every week to the very places we pray for in the Anglican communion? Follow John as he shares a little bit about the church and the places he visits:

Dear Pastors Amanda, Joe and Bishop Bob,

Greetings from Aberdeenshire, in the northeast of Scotland. I flew in to Edinburgh, took the train to Glasgow for a ceilidh, some chips and an Irn Bru, and another train up through the Highlands to here. I came for history as much as the beautiful scenery. Samuel Seabury was consecrated as America's first Episcopal Bishop at John Skinner's house, which is close to St. Andrew's Church in Aberdeen. If you wonder why the consecration was here, well that's just a starting point for a long tale with many twists and turns.

Samuel Seabury was born in Connecticut in 1729 and was ordained a priest in 1753 when the American colonies were ruled by King George III of England, and the church was officially the Church of England. When the American Revolution broke out it divided many friends, households, families, and loyalties. While Seabury was American born, he was quite loyal to King George, the church, and all those within his ministry. Coincidentally, I've heard that this is the 10th anniversary of the Broadway show "Hamilton," and it's being shown in movie theaters back home. I say coincidentally because Seabury and Alexander Hamilton were often at odds. Both were sincere in their beliefs of what was best for the colonies and the people. Hamilton advocated for American congressional action to resist the taxes imposed by the King and declare independence. Seabury published letters to him arguing the American Congress had no such authority. It was a complicated time indeed.

Many of the leaders of the Revolution were in fact members of the Anglican Church of England. While they wanted independence from England, they also wanted to hold onto their church traditions. The church leadership is an episcopacy. The church in the colonies needed a bishop, but the consecration rite included an oath of loyalty to the King. No English bishops would consecrate a new bishop who wouldn't recite that oath. What to do? Enter Scotland!

Scotland and England have a long history of dominance and independence efforts, going back to the battles of 1072, or 1296, or 1305 or 1314, or 1512 and 1587. The Act of Union in 1707 officially, and without an invading army, united the parliaments of Scotland and England, but then there were the Risings of 1715 and '45, and Culloden. While the parliaments have been united, it hasn't been without some level of animosity. The Scottish Episcopal Church has never pledged allegiance to the English Monarch. So, while John Skinner was Coadjutor Bishop of Aberdeen, along with Bishop Kilgore, and Bishop Petrie of Ross and Moray, they were content and able to consecrate Bishop Seabury without the burden of an oath to King George. Bishop Seabury was content to accept this consecration without the oath to the King in 1784, and the Episcopal Church in America continues to this day thanks to them.

Travels and History are a journey. Let's continue travelling together to see what the future holds. Blessings to you always,
