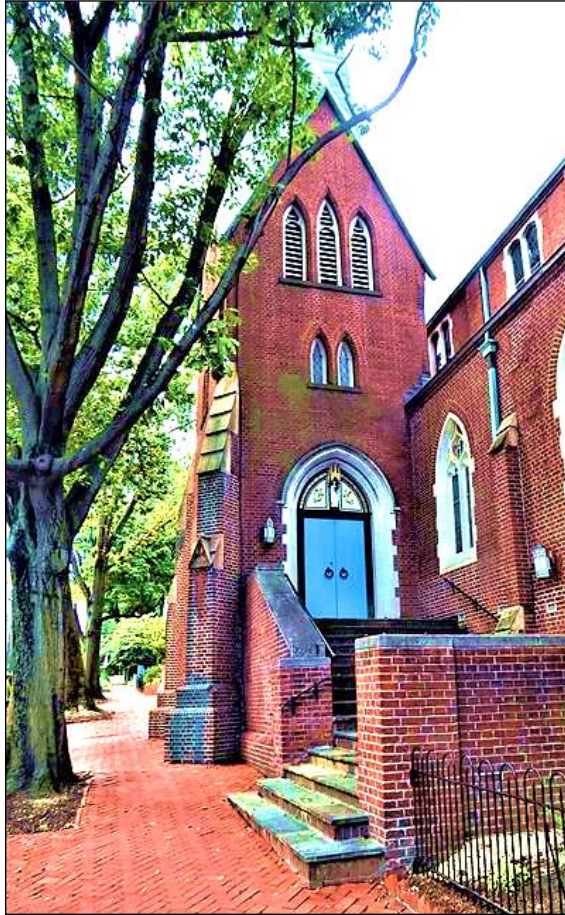

THE SECOND LESSON: Hebrews 12:18-29

You have not come to something that can be touched, a blazing fire, and darkness, and gloom, and a tempest, and the sound of a trumpet, and a voice whose words made the hearers beg that not another word be spoken to them. (For they could not endure the order that was given, "If even an animal touches the mountain, it shall be stoned to death." Indeed, so terrifying was the sight that Moses said, "I tremble with fear.") But you have come to Mount Zion and to the city of the living God, the heavenly Jerusalem, and to innumerable angels in festal gathering, and to the assembly of the firstborn who are enrolled in heaven, and to God the judge of all, and to the spirits of the righteous made perfect, and to Jesus, the mediator of a new covenant, and to the sprinkled blood that speaks a better word than the blood of Abel.

See that you do not refuse the one who is speaking; for if they did not escape when they refused the one who warned them on earth, how much less will we escape if we reject the one who warns from heaven! At that time his voice shook the earth; but now he has promised, "Yet once more I will shake not only the earth but also the heaven." This phrase, "Yet once more," indicates the removal of what is shaken-- that is, created things-- so that what cannot be shaken may remain. Therefore, since we are receiving a kingdom that cannot be shaken, let us give thanks, by which we offer to God an acceptable worship with reverence and awe; for indeed our God is a consuming fire.

Now Jesus was teaching in one of the synagogues on the sabbath. And just then there appeared a woman with a spirit that had crippled her for eighteen years. She was bent over and was quite unable to stand up straight. When Jesus saw her, he called her over and said, "Woman, you are set free from your ailment." When he laid his hands on her, immediately she stood up straight and began praising God. But the leader of the synagogue, indignant because Jesus had cured on the sabbath, kept saying to the crowd, "There are six days on which work ought to be done; come on those days and be cured, and not on the sabbath day." But the Lord answered him and said, "You hypocrites! Does not each of you on the sabbath untie his ox or his donkey from the manger, and lead it away to give it water? And ought not this woman, a daughter of Abraham whom Satan bound for eighteen long years, be set free from this bondage on the sabbath day?" When he said this, all his opponents were put to shame; and the entire crowd was rejoicing at all the wonderful things that he was doing.

Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.

He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Christ has died.

Christ is risen.

Christ will come again.

We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O Father, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling his death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts.

Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ. By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever.

St. John's Traveler Letter:

Did you know St. John's has a team of pilgrims who travel every week to the very places we pray for in the Anglican communion? Follow John as he shares a little bit about the church and the places he visits:

Dear Pastors Amanda and Joe, and Bishop Bob -

Selamat! Peace to you from Singapore where I'll be worshipping at St. Andrew's Cathedral on Sunday morning. St. Andrew's is clearly a European name, here in southeast Asia. There are so many cultural influences from other countries that some foodies snobbishly say there aren't any uniquely Singaporean dishes. Along with occasional fish and chips shops, many of the spices and flavors here were originally Hainan, Cantonese, Indian, and Indonesian, along with fusions from Vietnam and Australia. Of course, many of those country states at one time or another invaded or ruled what finally became Singapore in the 1800's. European influences appeared during the years of exploration in the early 1500's. Portuguese, Dutch, and later English trading opportunities led to missions spreading "western" education, art, culture, and theology. The first Anglican church was built in 1837, followed by a school shortly after. Clergy and teachers were well established leading up to the start of the Second World War when Japan seized control of Malaysia and Singapore, and all European clergy were exiled. Just as we spoke last week about the need for local leadership in the American colonies in the absence of English clergy, the remaining church leaders here recognized the need to train and ordain local priests and deacons. The current bishops, priests, and deacons are predominantly locally born and raised.

Singapore is like an Asian zoo in reverse. It's a city state of bright glass skyscrapers reaching to the clouds, encircled by the woodlands and wildlife of the surrounding jungle. The city is safe and very modern, and rather expensive. It attracts so many people from around the world, to the point that almost a third of the total population are expats from other countries. I'm on the southern tip of Malaysia and Malay is the official primary language, but English is commonly spoken so I've been able to meet many new friends and actually understand what they're saying without resorting to clumsy hand motions. I'm looking forward to hearing and joining in their prayers and music. While you are praying for the good people here, we will be praying for you in America in the hope that we can all get along and live in peace and security.
