

With acolytes and processions, communal singing, and a mission to love and serve our neighbors, this service invites one to participate in the coming of the Kingdom. At St. John's everyone is welcome to the Lord's table.

ADDITIONAL WORSHIP OPPORTUNITIES

Our Wednesday healing service at 12:00 P.M. is an invitation to lay before God the people and situations in need of healing. This service, using the Book of Common Prayer and other resources, is grounded in healing prayers, anointing with holy oil, and the sharing of the sacrament. The service is short enough to accommodate lunch breaks yet full enough to transform hearts.

Every Thursday at 9:00 A.M. Brother David leads Morning Prayer in the Mary Chapel. This quiet, contemplative service is open to all and is a wonderful way to begin one's day. The service lasts about 20 minutes.

Celebrant The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.

Jesus said to the disciples, "There was a rich man who had a manager, and charges were brought to him that this man was squandering his property. So he summoned him and said to him, 'What is this that I hear about you? Give me an accounting of your management, because you cannot be my manager any longer.' Then the manager said to himself, 'What will I do, now that my master is taking the position away from me? I am not strong enough to dig, and I am ashamed to beg. I have decided what to do so that, when I am dismissed as manager, people may welcome me into their homes.' So, summoning his master's debtors one by one, he asked the first, 'How much do you owe my master?' He answered, 'A hundred jugs of olive oil.' He said to him, 'Take your bill, sit down quickly, and make it fifty.' Then he asked another, 'And how much do you owe?' He replied, 'A hundred containers of wheat.' He said to him, 'Take your bill and make it eighty.' And his master commended the dishonest manager because he had acted shrewdly; for the children of this age are more shrewd in dealing with their own

generation than are the children of light. And I tell you, make friends for yourselves by means of dishonest wealth so that when it is gone, they may welcome you into the eternal homes.

"Whoever is faithful in a very little is faithful also in much; and whoever is dishonest in a very little is dishonest also in much. If then you have not been faithful with the dishonest wealth, who will entrust to you the true riches? And if you have not been faithful with what belongs to another, who will give you what is your own? No slave can serve two masters; for a slave will either hate the one and love the other, or be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and wealth."

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:


Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

St. John's Traveler Letter:

Did you know St. John's has a team of pilgrims who travel every week to the very places we pray for in the Anglican communion? Follow John as he shares a little bit about the church and the places he visits:

Dear Pastors Amanda and Joe,

Oftentimes I write you letters bringing joy from far-off corners of the globe, from southeast Asia to central America. Today, unfortunately, is not one of these letters. For the past week, I've been stuck at the small Kenyan town of Nadapal trying to talk with the authorities about traveling to the nation of South Sudan, just over the border. And for the past week I've been unsuccessful.

Earlier this year, the State Department put out a warning telling US citizens to "do not travel" to South Sudan. It's the youngest country in the world and also the poorest, and has been caught in a cycle of violence even after its civil war officially ended in 2020. More than four million people have been forced to leave their homes. To make matters worse, severe flooding has devastated local towns and villages.

As recently as 2023, the United States spent more than \$760 million on emergency food assistance and health care in South Sudan, but recent decisions to all but eliminate this aid have made South Sudan's terrible situation even worse.

Earlier this week, I spoke with Napita, a mother of eight who somehow slipped across the border undetected. She doesn't know where three of her children are. She hasn't seen her husband since a militia overran a military base where he was stationed in March. She's spent the last few days trying to find someone to watch the kids she led across the border so she can go back to her hometown and search for the remaining children.

That's just one story of many I've witnessed here on the frontier of one of the world's most dangerous states. Please pray for Napita, pray for her family, and pray for an end to the violence that's ruptured families here and around the world.
