#### **ADULT FORMATION**

In 2017, I found myself sitting in an Episcopal Church on a two-day retreat with Fr. Laurence Freeman, a Benedictine monk, Catholic Priest, and leader of the World Community for Christian Meditation (WCCM). Those two days were spent exploring the practice of contemplation and meditation in the Christian tradition. For me, it was a gateway to silence, to stillness, to gratitude, and a way of being with God. It shaped my prayer life in significant ways and deepened my walk with Christ, setting me on the path I am on today. It's for this reason, among many others, that I'm excited to share these practices with St. John's. Contemplative prayer is a particular way of praying – it's a way of being that involves silence, stillness, and paying attention.

I'm continually impressed with all that we do at St. John's. We are on the go, striving to do the work of God's kingdom. We love our neighbors. We feed, clothe, and welcome our neighbors; we offer space for those in recovery; and we open our doors as a place of beauty, prayer, and worship for all who enter. This is sacred work, all of this doing. And I also believe that we can couple it with practices that allow us to be still amid all this necessary work, allowing that stillness to deepen the way in which we offer our gifts to the world.

St. Augustine reminds us that we are "called home from the noise that is around us to the joys that are silent. Why do we rush about searching for God who is already here at home with us?" Creating silent, contemplative space plants a seed in our heart to notice God amid our lives, so we can then go out into the world, be the Church, and do the work Christ calls us to. I hope you'll find some time to join me beginning October 5th from 9:15–10:00am, between our two services. Using practices shaped by the WCCM, we will spend time learning, practicing, and discussing what it means to cultivate inner stillness through prayer. I look forward to exploring it together.






# Food Pantry News October 2025

As of the end of August, the Food Pantry has raised approximately \$27,277 of the \$33,000 we have targeted to meet expenses for 2025. Thank you so much for this support! We have provided food for 9,001 people during the last 8 months which is almost as many people as we served in all of 2024 (9,071)! The need remains great.

We have several activities coming up between now and Thanksgiving to help collect the food and funds we will need to complete this year (and start off next year).



#### **MUSINGS FROM THE ORGAN BENCH**

Make our church one joyful choir on this glad festive day and by song invoke the fire that invites our hearts to pray: Shape us, Christ, to live and claim all it means to bear your name.

Bend us low by song and prayer, low enough to lift the cross and to take the weight and bear loves' uncounted final cost. Shape us, Christ, to live and claim all it means to bear your name. (Thomas Troeger, Borrowed Light, Oxford University Press, New York 1994, p. 59)

Those are just two of the verses of a hymn by Thomas Troeger that says just a bit about my views of what "church" should be from the organ bench, leading the singing and worship music here at St. John's. I will share the rest of the hymn next month, when we move into a time of Thanksgiving and preparation for the Advent season.

This month, the choir will continue to share in their music leadership through anthems and hymns. Another of our musical groups in the church, the bell choir will be performing in the month of October and then again in November. Speaking of bell choir, the call goes out again for more ringers!!! We have three octaves of bells, but can only use a portion of those as we have 5 ringers (counting myself, the director!) We have drawers full of good music but we need the ringers to make that music come alive from sheets of printed music. Bell choir ensembles are unlike any other musical group, I have found. In a vocal choir, if a section is missing, it can usually be covered with the accompaniment or another person moving to another part. Bell ringers usually have specific bells that consistently play. So...all that to say, please consider joining the bell choir which rehearses on Thursday evenings at 7 p.m.

Moving into November, I am working on an Evensong service to be held on Sunday, November 23 in the evening. It follows our Maker's Market which takes place the day before. Our Evensong will center around St. Cecilia, the patron saint of music, whose image is depicted in the stained glass window in the tower entrance, and on our church's web site. St. Cecilia's Day is actually the day before, the 22nd, the day of our Maker's Market! A reception will follow the Evensong, which should be a good way to finish out the weekend...Maker's Market on Saturday, Christ the King Sunday focus on Sunday morning, and the Evensong service around St. Cecilia and the blessing of music in the Christian faith.

#### FINANCIALS BY CHARLES WEAR, TREASURER

The first budgeted draw from our endowment account was made in August to satisfy cash needs. The timing of this \$30k transfer follows the historic pattern to supplement declining income during the summer months. The August income statement shows the transfer as a surplus for the month of about the same amount. Otherwise, August and YTD aggregate operating expenses are and remain below budget.

Capital gifts of \$7.4k were received in August, bringing the total for the project to \$791.4k. Per Vestry approval, \$6.5k of the Lyet/Summy bequest was transferred to the Capital account. This additional one-time bequest and pre-campaign donations bring the grand total received for the project to \$914.6k, with an additional \$203.2k in pledges outstanding. The estimated total project cost has increased slightly to \$1.26 million due to higher patching and repair costs, leaving \$146.1k as additional need.

Capital expenses for the month totaled \$51.3k. Included was the final payment of \$42.1k for the Mary Window. The capital checking account is approaching minimum balance. Unless increased gifting occurs in the near term, we will have to tap the Orrstown loan facility for incoming bills.


#### IF OUR BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS COULD SPEAK...
