

With acolytes and processions, communal singing, and a mission to love and serve our neighbors, this service invites one to participate in the coming of the Kingdom. At St. John's everyone is welcome to the Lord's table.

ADDITIONAL WORSHIP OPPORTUNITIES

Our Wednesday healing service at 12:00 P.M. is an invitation to lay before God the people and situations in need of healing. This service, using the Book of Common Prayer and other resources, is grounded in healing prayers, anointing with holy oil, and the sharing of the sacrament. The service is short enough to accommodate lunch breaks yet full enough to transform hearts.

Every Thursday at 9:00 A.M. Brother David leads Morning Prayer in the Mary Chapel. This quiet, contemplative service is open to all and is a wonderful way to begin one's day. The service lasts about 20 minutes.

These are the words of the letter that the prophet Jeremiah sent from Jerusalem to the remaining elders among the exiles, and to the priests, the prophets, and all the people, whom Nebuchadnezzar had taken into exile from Jerusalem to Babylon.

Thus says the Lord of hosts, the God of Israel, to all the exiles whom I have sent into exile from Jerusalem to Babylon: Build houses and live in them; plant gardens and eat what they produce. Take wives and have sons and daughters; take wives for your sons, and give your daughters in marriage, that they may bear sons and daughters; multiply there, and do not decrease. But seek the welfare of the city where I have sent you into exile, and pray to the Lord on its behalf, for in its welfare you will find your welfare.

THE EPISTLE: 2 Timothy 2:8-15

Remember Jesus Christ, raised from the dead, a descendant of David-- that is my gospel, for which I suffer hardship, even to the point of being chained like a criminal. But the word of God is not chained. Therefore I endure everything for the sake of the elect, so that they may also obtain the salvation that is in Christ Jesus, with eternal glory. The saying is sure:

If we have died with him, we will also live with him; if we endure, we will also reign with him; if we deny him, he will also deny us; if we are faithless, he remains faithful-for he cannot deny himself.

Remind them of this, and warn them before God that they are to avoid wrangling over words, which does no good but only ruins those who are listening. Do your best to present yourself to God as one approved by him, a worker who has no need to be ashamed, rightly explaining the word of truth.

Celebrant The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.

On the way to Jerusalem Jesus was going through the region between Samaria and Galilee. As he entered a village, ten lepers approached him. Keeping their distance, they called out, saying, "Jesus, Master, have mercy on us!" When he saw them, he said to them, "Go and show yourselves to the priests." And as they went, they were made clean. Then one of them, when he saw that he was healed, turned back, praising God with a loud voice. He prostrated himself at Jesus' feet and thanked him. And he was a Samaritan. Then Jesus asked, "Were not ten made clean? But the other nine, where are they? Was none of them found to return and give praise to God except this foreigner?" Then he said to him, "Get up and go on your way; your faith has made you well."


Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

DISCERNING THE MINISTRY OF VESTRY

MYTH

Vestry meetings last for at least five hours and go well into the middle of the night.

FACT

We respect your time and value productive and fruitful meetings. Monthly meetings last no longer than two hours max.

MYTH

There is weeping and gnashing of teeth on the vestry, people fight constantly.

FACT

Every year, the vestry establishes a shared covenant to which we all abide by. We value relationships over "positions." Our ministry is collaborative, prayerful, and spirit led. We share a common mission: to serve the best interests of the parish.

MYTH

In order to serve on vestry you need to know everything there is to know about the Episcopal Church and be the best Christian in the world.

FACT

Vestry members must be confirmed members in the Episcopal Church, committed to regular worship, and open to the movement of the Holy Spirit.

MYTH

All the vestry does is complain & argue about money.

FACT

The vestry has oversight of the well-being of the church and yes, that includes the finances, the buildings and grounds, and the assets. Vestries are also visionaries, creative thinkers, encouragers, and strategic planners.

Serving on the vestry is both an honor and privilege. St. John's Traveler Letter:

Did you know St. John's has pilgrims who travel to the very places we pray for in the Anglican communion? Follow John as he shares about the church & places he visits:

Dear Pastors Amanda and Joe,

Greetings this week from Kampala, the capital and largest city in Uganda. It sits on the northern shore of Lake Ukerewe, although most people today know it as Lake Victoria. It was renamed in 1858 in honor of England's Queen Victoria by John Speke, who was sent here on expedition in search of the headwaters of the Nile River. Uganda has been at the center of trade and discovery and conflict since long before the English and the Anglican Church arrived, though. Traders from the east travelled through to the Mediterranean. Conquerors invaded from the north. People of different faiths and cultures came to this rich and fertile land, either passing through or staying, mixing their immigrant traditions with those of the indigenous local folks. One of the tasks of the English expeditions in the mid 1800's was to attempt to end the active slave trade of the region, and missionaries of the Anglican Church assisted in that, bringing our worship traditions that proclaim respect for all people.

Today Uganda has a democratic government, although it's not without controversy and problems, and extreme poverty. Approximately 40% of the people get by on less than \$1.50 a day. I was able to meet up with the staff of World Bicycle Relief, which provides bikes to families wanting to get their children to school to improve literacy, aid workers going to see people in need of healthcare, and folks delivering their garden produce to the market or involved in other small businesses. They say it's not a bike, but a tool for economic development. One of those they've helped is Millicent Mukwezi who sells clothes in Kampala's sprawling Owino Market. Interestingly, most of the clothes she sells are second-hand clothes from America. Do you know that a lot of the used clothes you donate to organizations like Goodwill are shipped here. Millicent and others buy them by the kilo / pound, and resell them by the item. They're usually of better quality at a lower price than new clothes they can get locally. I saw an \$80 Adidas sweatshirt in almost new condition for \$16. So when you see photos of young children in really poor places wearing a sweatshirt that's just like the one you used to have, it may in fact be it! We live with worldwide ties that are economic, cultural, and spiritual. I'm glad you're including these good people of Uganda in your prayers today. Let's hold each other close to our hearts.
