

This service is filled with the joyful sound of children rustling in the pews, anthems sung to the glory of God, and the heartfelt prayers of those gathered. With acolytes and processions, communal singing, and a mission to love and serve our neighbors, this service invites one to participate in the coming of the Kingdom. At St. John's everyone is welcome to the Lord's table.

ADDITIONAL WORSHIP OPPORTUNITIES

Our Wednesday healing service at 12:00 P.M. is an invitation to lay before God the people and situations in need of healing. This service, using the Book of Common Prayer and other resources, is grounded in healing prayers, anointing with holy oil, and the sharing of the sacrament. The service is short enough to accommodate lunch breaks yet full enough to transform hearts.

Every Thursday at 9:00 A.M. Brother David leads Morning Prayer in the Mary Chapel. This quiet, contemplative service is open to all and is a wonderful way to begin one's day. The service lasts about 20 minutes.

THE EPISTLE: 2 Timothy 1:1-14

Paul, an apostle of Christ Jesus by the will of God, for the sake of the promise of life that is in Christ Jesus, To Timothy, my beloved child: Grace, mercy, and peace from God the Father and Christ Jesus our Lord. I am grateful to God-- whom I worship with a clear conscience, as my ancestors did-- when I remember you constantly in my prayers night and day. Recalling your tears, I long to see you so that I may be filled with joy. I am reminded of your sincere faith, a faith that lived first in your grandmother Lois and your mother Eunice and now, I am sure, lives in you. For this reason I remind you to rekindle the gift of God that is within you through the laying on of my hands; for God did not give us a spirit of cowardice, but rather a spirit of power and of love and of self-discipline. Do not be ashamed, then, of the testimony about our Lord or of me his prisoner, but join with me in suffering for the gospel, relying on the power of God, who saved us and called us with a holy calling, not according to our works but according to his own purpose and grace. This grace was given to us in Christ Jesus before the ages began, but it has now been revealed through the appearing of our Savior Christ Jesus, who abolished death and

brought life and immortality to light through the gospel. For this gospel I was appointed a herald and an apostle and a teacher, and for this reason I suffer as I do. But I am not ashamed, for I know the one in whom I have put my trust, and I am sure that he is able to guard until that day what I have entrusted to him. Hold to the standard of sound teaching that you have heard from me, in the faith and love that are in Christ Jesus. Guard the good treasure entrusted to you, with the help of the Holy Spirit living in us.

SERMON The Rev. Amanda Knouse


Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

St. John's Traveler Letter:

Did you know St. John's has a team of pilgrims who travel every week to the very places we pray for in the Anglican communion? Follow John as he shares a little bit about the church and the places he visits:

Dear Pastors Amanda and Joe,

Harabi from Tanzania! It's been a week of celebration in this nation in east-central Africa. Late last week, a runner by the name of Alphonce Felix Simbu became the first Tanzanian to win gold in the marathon. Even though the full race was more than 26 miles, it was a photo finish as Alphonce only won by 0.03 seconds – less time than it takes to snap your fingers!

During the race, I wandered through Kariakoo Market, normally a place where people of all sorts of backgrounds – African, Arab, Indian, and European – gather together to sell and purchase all sorts of things like bananas, passion fruit, pineapples, and coffee. But today, everyone was gathered around a giant 50 foot screen set up in the center of the marketplace, watching the race and cheering on Alphonce every step of the way.

Since his big win, the atmosphere here in Dar-Es-Salaam has been a friendly chaos. People were honking in the street, setting off bonfires, and celebrating with friends. It reminded me of when the Philadelphia Eagles won the Super Bowl earlier this year!

Even the church services here were more joyful than usual. We blessed three animals named Alphonce at today's blessing of the animals and some children raced up the aisle for communion, pretending it was a marathon. People of all backgrounds here — and there are many — have taken pride in Alphonce and what he represents for themselves, their family, and their country.

There's an optimism here that I haven't seen in a while and I hope it's contagious. To everyone back home, I hope you find your Alphonce, whatever that may look like. Run fast!
